

# WONDERFUL WIRELESS MESSAGE WAS CORRESPONDENT ROSE'S DISPATCH

When word was received March 9 from Norman Rose, staff correspondent of this newspaper with Admiral Evans, of the whereabouts of the great battleship fleet, it was not only an evidence of Rose's alertness and of the perfect arrangements by which it was insured that every movement of the big armada would be given the readers of The Daily Star without the least delay, but it was the most remarkable wireless message yet transmitted and received in the history of that mysterious agency.

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reached Magdalena bay. It was the longest leg of the notable voyage. Rose determined to try the wireless. Then out from the upper works of the battleship Georgia the famous message began to sputter, telling of the exact whereabouts of the fleet and that it was two days ahead of schedule. The wonderful waves circled over the Pacific. One portion of them passed over the city of Acapulco, in Mexico, and pushed on above the high Sierra mountains. On it went, past the smoldering crater of Popocatepetl, 17,520 feet high, the loftiest of Mexico's great volcanoes, and on northwest; over the mountains again and then out above the blue gulf of Mexico. The fleet was steaming on, but Rose's message home kept speeding along, hundreds of miles more

## TWO MEMBERS GET NO RAISE

Two members of the city council which organized today will not enjoy the benefit of the salary increase provided by the charter amendment adopted at the recent city election. These are Councilmen-at-large F. P. Mullen and F. H. Hurd. They are both hold-over councilmen, having been elected two years ago to terms of four years.

stitution and statutes provide that no public official's salary shall be increased or diminished during the term for which he was elected, and as the increase was voted during their terms of office it will not affect their salaries.

The increase in the salaries of councilmen is from \$75 a month to \$150 a month, an increase of 100 per cent, a much greater proportionate increase than was granted to any other public official in the charter amendments. On account of the amount of the increase, and perhaps on account of the popular distrust of the council, the amendment increasing the salaries of councilmen was the least popular of all the amendments voted on at the recent elec-

tion and was adopted by the narrowest majority.

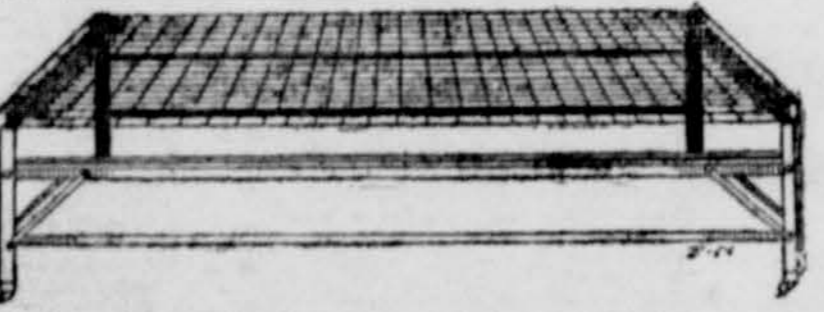

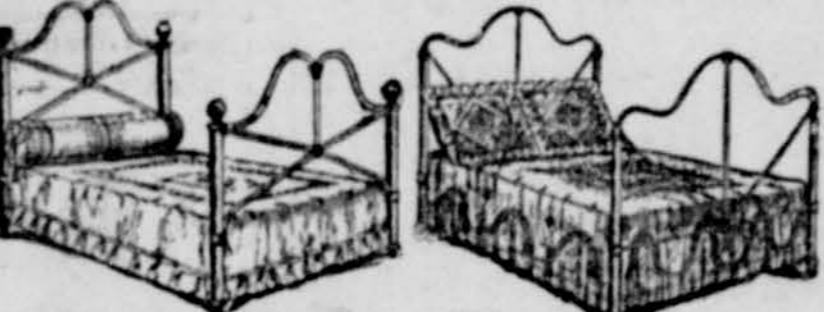
