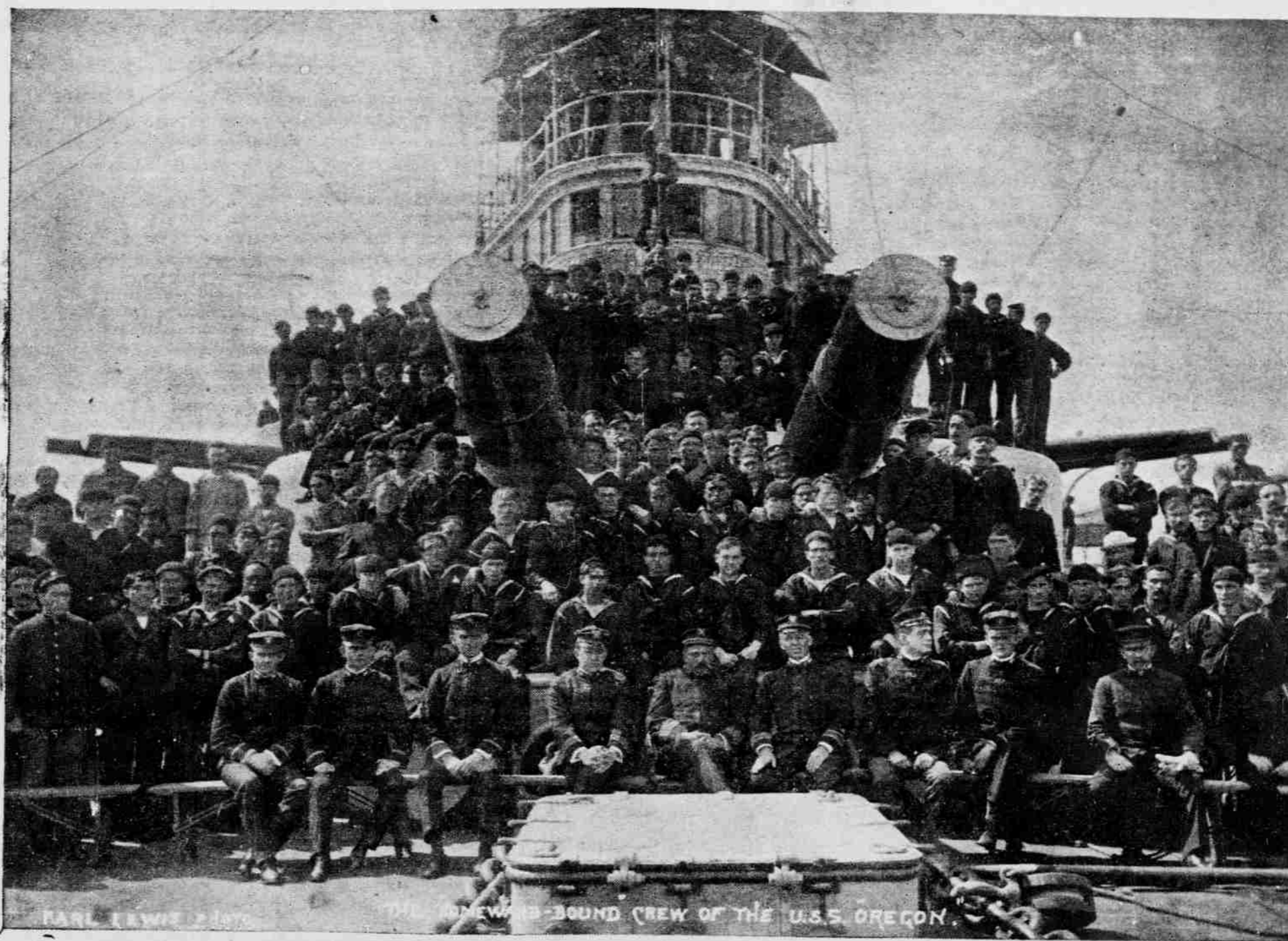

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THE "HOMEWARD BOUND" CREW OF THE U. S. S. OREGON.

BAND PLAYS WHILE OREGON TAKES ON COAL SUPPLY

There is nothing like good music to make a man work hard and nobody knows this better than your Uncle Sam, for when he orders his bluejackets to coal ship he details, when possible, a warship band to keep time. This was fully carried out on the battleship Oregon yesterday. She took coal from the dock and from barges and by afternoon the trim, clean, white-sided warship was a mass of coal dust. As for the sailors they looked like blacks from blackest Africa. But the band played all day long and the sailors worked willingly. When a quickstep was played the sailors stepped lively to their task and when there was a waltz, the bluejackets did the two-step, with their shovels and coal baskets.

Everybody but the captain works on a warship when coal is being taken aboard. Not another officer or man escapes this duty. Nobody can play the Beau Brummel of such an occasion. The officers have little of the natty appearance they present when ladies are about. They don't dungarees and get black in the face, just the same as the bluejacket and the marine. But you can tell an officer from a bluejacket even then, because the officer sits down when he can.

The Oregon will take in 1600 tons of coal and will finish the job today. She will then be cleaned up and made presentable, and it is quite possible that on Friday the people of Honolulu may be given an opportunity to inspect the famous craft, for the Oregon has almost the same sacredness to the American public as the Constitution, "Old Ironsides." The vessel is scheduled to leave for San Francisco on Saturday.

"JACKIES," A VULGAR TERM.
"Say," said a bluejacket yesterday to a reporter, "I wish you would have people correct themselves about calling us 'jackies.' If there is a name which American sailors deserve it is the term 'jackies.' We don't deserve the name. Call us bluejackets, if you will, but cut out 'jackies.'"

And so says Captain Albion V. Wadhams, U. S. N., captain of the navy yard at Norfolk, Va. He has protested vigorously against the practice of referring to enlisted men as "jackies." That, he says, is a landsman's term and nobody in the navy ever used it. "It is a term of reproach," he says in an interview in the New York Sun, "of patronizing and insufferable condescension. Men don't like to be called names, and men in the Navy are just as human as those ashore. If they are to be called anything let it be bluejackets. That is not bad, and is much more dignified than 'jackies.'"

A MEMORABLE INCIDENT.
When the Oregon made her record run from the Pacific to the Atlantic Ocean in March, April and May, 1898, to augment the fleet ready to oppose the Spanish squadron, there was a little incident aboard which is memorable. When the vessel was steaming into the portion of the ocean where the Spanish fleet was expected to be seen, Captain Clark made a little speech to the officers and crew. He said that of course everybody hoped that the Oregon would have a chance to show her prowess. There was more to the speech about what was expected of the men in case the battleship fell in with a mysterious fleet, but there was not a man aboard who was not keyed up to the hope that the battleship would be the only boat to encounter the whole Spanish squadron, and what is more there was not a man who did not believe that the Oregon could send most of the Spanish boats to the bottom. The regulations, of course, require that no commander shall engage a superior fleet, unless he is compelled to. The chances are that in the case of the Oregon, had she known of the whereabouts of the Spanish squadron, that Captain Clarke would have found

himself "compelled to" engage the whole fleet.

CAPTAIN IS STRICT.

Captain Merrell enjoys the reputation aboard his ship of being a man who is very particular and strict about everything that he orders done and what he does himself. In other words he is the type of naval officer of the old school and therefore one who is well liked by the men under him.

Admiral and Mrs. Lyon, Captain Merrell of the Oregon and Dr. C. B. Cooper will form a dinner party who are to be entertained this evening at the Alexander Young hotel by Mr. and Mrs. Noah Gray. Captain Merrell and Mr. Gray's father were old-time friends.

A fine minstrel company aboard the

battleship is figuring on giving a minstrel show on Naval Dock No. 2 while in port. The show may be given Friday night.
