of Oregon to be maintained for historical purposes without expense to the navy has renewed interest in the famous old sea fighter that broke all naval traditions and records by her race

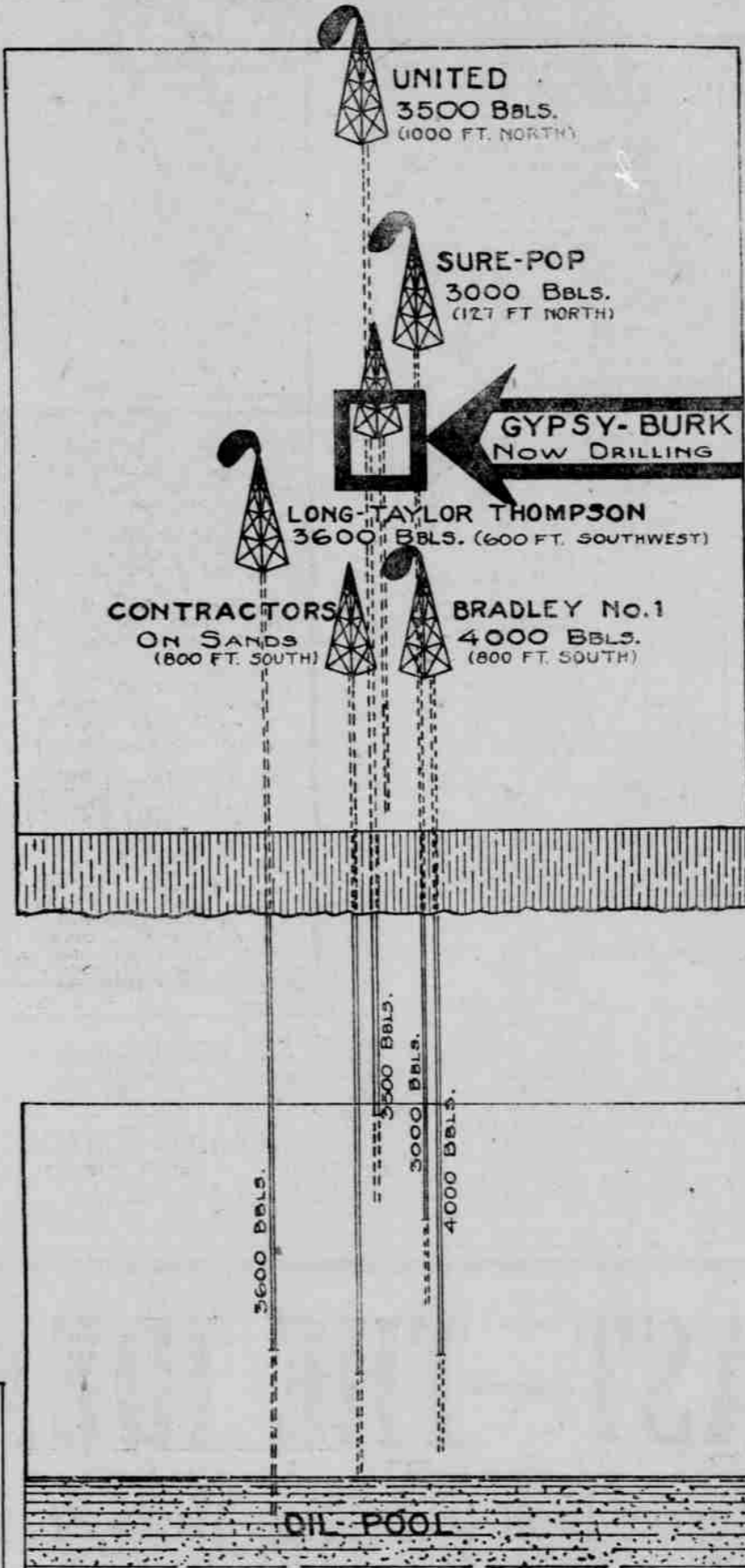

ITALIAN MOBS RIOT IN PROTEST OF THE HIGH COST OF FOOD

FLORENCE, July 4.—(By the Associated Press).—Serious riots occurred here today in protest against the high cost of living. Mobs sacked several shops. At the gates of the city rioters held up merchants coming in with their produce and fixed their own prices.

The mobs backed camions up to the entrances of the stores and loaded the vehicles with foodstuffs. Then the camions were whirled to strike headquarters where the provisions were distributed. Only food stores were looted.

develop. You have seen the tide of battle turn and have followed the success of our troops through the final victory.

You will recall our beginning with the first division at Cantigny; then, when in greater numbers, our forces carried forward the brunt of the Marne-Somme offensive which gave the allies the initiative, later, when they fought beside the allies in Champagne and again when they were united as the First Army in the battle of St. Mihiel, and finally, their supreme effort in the Meuse-Argonne where the decisive blow of the war was struck.

Now the Victories of Peace Great have been the victories of war, but we must now engage for the victories of peace. Conditions confront we Americans in which we will have to use our best efforts and abilities. Important financial questions are to be met, disturbances in our industrial life are to be equitably adjusted, and the lessons of the war are to be taken seriously that we may not again neglect preparedness.

At the outset it is for us to see that the conditions of peace are faithfully performed and that those who were responsible for the war pay the full penalty. Let no one doubt that it is fixed purpose to see that the terms of the treaty are completely fulfilled.

This war has brought about among the allies a common understanding, independence should cherish and perpetuate, as our representatives, those amicable relations necessary to a continuance of accord between our two peoples.

MANY DIE AS LAKE STEAMBOAT UPSETS

Only meagre reports have been received here, due to poor wire communication. The boat is said to have turned completely over twice and then sank.
