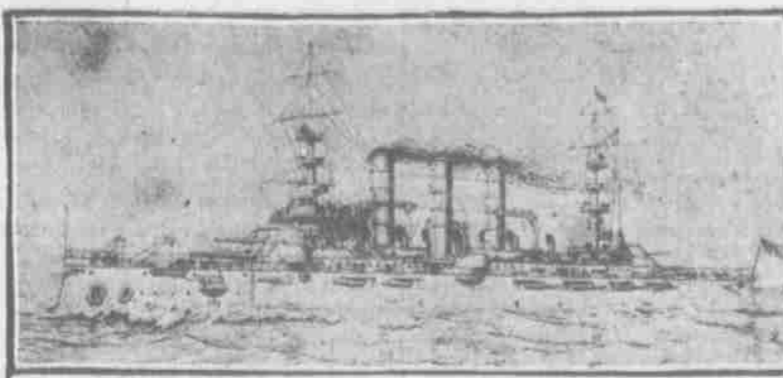

WON BATTLESHIPS' RACE



U.S. BATTLESHIP "GEORGIA" and MISS STELLA TATE WHO WILL CAPTAIN IT.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.—Victorious in two races, the battleship Georgia arrived at League Island yesterday one hour and seven minutes after the battleship Kansas, which started from Cape Cod four hours before its rival. In making this gain of 2 hours and 53 minutes on the Kansas the Georgia humbled the battleship Rhode Island even more decisively by "smiling it below the horizon" in two hours.

The races between the battleships were entirely impromptu and were caused merely by the desire of captains sailing over the same course to make creditable time for their vessels. The Kansas was the first to receive its sailing orders from Rear Admiral Evans while the North Atlantic fleet was cruising off Cape Cod on Sunday morning, and at 7 a. m. the battleship shaped its course for the Delaware Capes. The Georgia started at 11 a. m., together with the Rhode Island, which was ordered to New York.

WORLD'S NEWS BY CABLE

NEW YORK October 11.—The steamship Lusitania has reached Sandy Hook from Liverpool, making the trip in four days and twenty hours. Her average running time on the voyage was twenty-four knots.

On her first trip this mammoth liner made the run in five days and fifty-four minutes, which beat the best previous record by six hours. On Wednesday the liner lowered the record for a twenty-four hour run, making six hundred and seventeen knots in that time.

NAVY COAL EXEMPT.
WASHINGTON, October 11.—Attorney General Bonaparte has given a decision in the matter of coal carried for the use of the navy in foreign bottoms, stating that such coal may be landed at its destination free of all duties.

VANCOUVER, October 11.—J. Reed, who took a leading part in the anti-Japanese riots in Vancouver, has been tried for his offense and was yesterday sentenced to imprisonment for six months.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, October 11.—Cassie Chadwick, serving a sentence for the swindling of a number of prominent bankers on forged notes, purporting to have been signed by Andrew Carnegie, died in prison here yesterday.

MOBILE, Alabama, October 11.—The owners of the fruit vessels running out of this port are shipping Chinese

The Rhode Island was no match for the Georgia, which has barely been in the water one year, but has its machinery and engines tried out to perfection. The Georgia, after steaming the Rhode Island "below the horizon," kept up a 19-knot club all the way to the Delaware Capes. When the Georgia passed Reedy Island at 10:07 a. m. yesterday, Captain McCrea learned that he had outstripped the Kansas, which passed Reedy Island at 9 a. m., and made the 400-mile trip from Cape Cod, at an average speed of 18 knots an hour.

The double victory of the Georgia will be celebrated by the officers and crew today, which happens to be the first birthday anniversary of the battleship. Both the Georgia and the Kansas will have their hulls cleaned in the new \$5,000,000 drydock at League Island and undergo a general overhauling. The Maine and the Kearsarge have also been ordered to League Island for overhauling before the big sea fighters start on their long voyage to the Pacific.

STANDARD OIL'S LITTLE PAMPHLET

STATEMENTS IN IT CALLED TO ATTENTION OF CHICAGO FEDERAL JURY.

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Judge Kenesaw M. Landis, in one of the most dramatic of the episodes which recently have made his court world-famous, today directed a new and unexpected move against the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. The jurist also announced to the special grand jury assembled in his court that the promise of immunity made by the department of justice to the Chicago & Alton Railroad Company must be observed. Then in place of the expected discharge of the jury came the new attack on the Indiana Oil Company, in answer to what the judge considered a reflection on the honor of his court.

A subpoena was ordered issued for James A. Moffet, president of the corporation, and the grand jury was instructed to hold itself in readiness to investigate charges credited to Mr. Moffet in a pamphlet circulated in the name of the Standard Oil Company.

Judge Landis read from a little yellow-backed booklet an extract from a statement credited to Mr. Moffet, in which it was said:

"Thousands of tons of freight have been shipped from these points during the fifteen years past under the same circumstances as the Standard shipments and if the Standard is guilty in this case so is practically every other shipper in this great manufacturing territory. Is there a purpose in selecting the Standard as the victim?"

Then, extending his finger impressively toward the grand jurors and speaking in a low voice that filled the silent courtroom, Judge Landis said: "I hope I do not need to say to you gentlemen that the highest ambition I have as an occupant of this bench is that no man may truthfully allege what is contained in this pamphlet."
