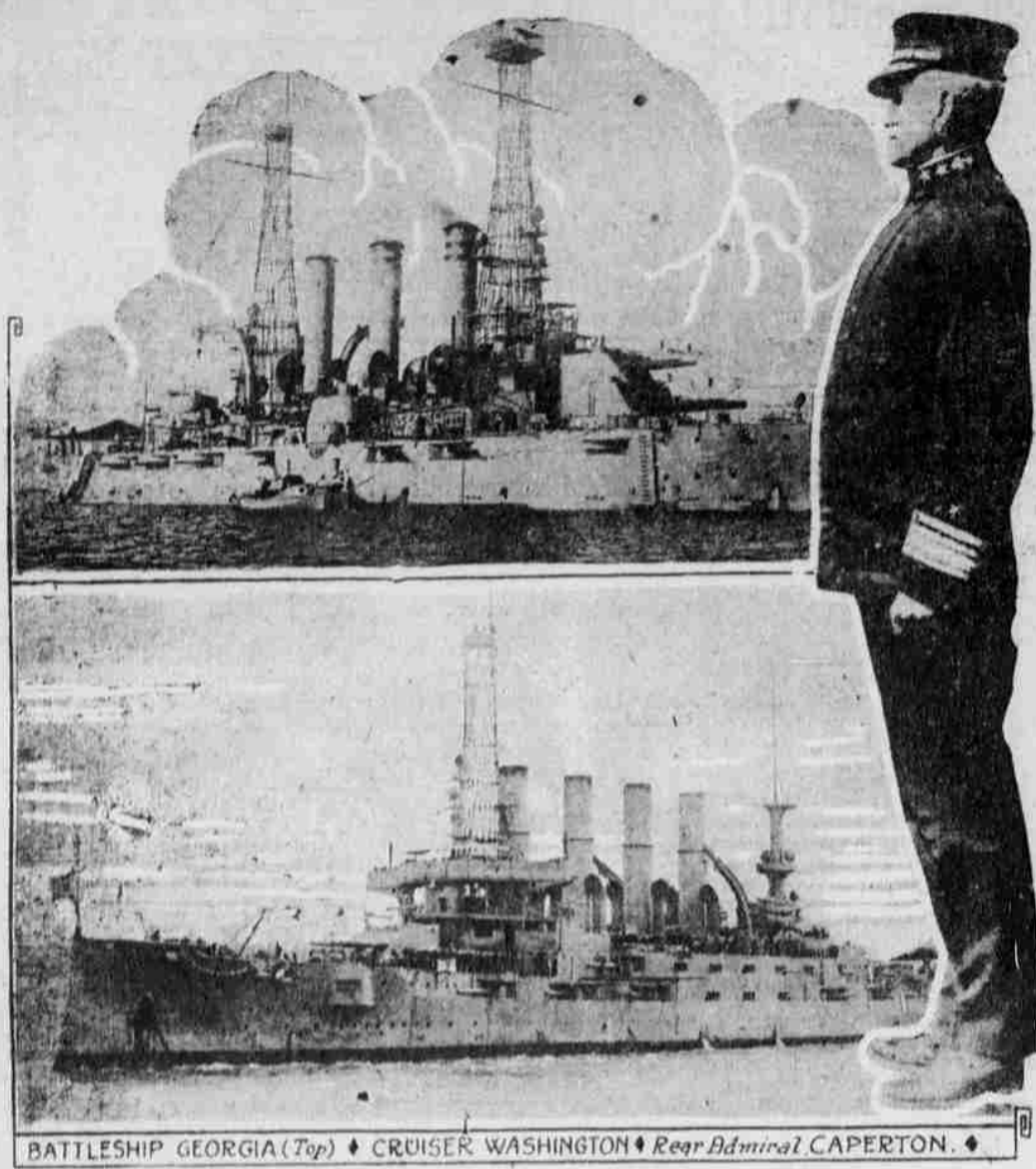


MORE AMERICAN WARSHIPS SAILED TO VERA CRUZ RECENTLY FOLLOWING TRANSMISSION OF SHARP NOTE TO GENERAL CARRANZA

Washington, March 24.—With the presence there of the Delaware and Mexican situation more unsettled than smaller ships. Rear Admiral Caperton it has been since the European war he is commander of the cruiser squadron, and the administration felt justified and the Washington is his flagship. In ordering the battleship Georgia and Rear Admiral Fletcher will not go to the cruiser Washington to Vera Cruz Vera Cruz unless the trouble in Mexico to add to the moral effect of the City becomes more acute. Intervention talk is heard here again, but the president will stick to his policy of noninterference unless a real crisis arises that will force him to act. His sharp warning to Carranza is expected to have its effect.

STATE NEWS

Cove Bay Harbor: A. H. Derbyshire exhibited a steelhead trout Monday which measured 30 inches and weighed 6 1/2 pounds. The fish was caught with a common jute net which he uses for fly fishing. He hooked the fish well and after playing it for 15 minutes managed to land it safely by the aid of a landing net. The net was witnessed by C. F. Chase, who also took some nice fish, one of which weighed 20 pounds. The fish were caught at Packers creek, on Cove river.

Grants Pass Courier: Spaulding Bros. have just received an order for a carload of dressed white pine lumber for shipment to Covington, Kentucky. The car will go forward at once, and is the first shipment to that point.

Marshfield Mail Tribune: Insect life under the warm weather of the last three days has flourished, being characterized by the birth of scores of white winged butterflies. House flies also have made their appearance. The mercury this afternoon at 2 o'clock registered 83 degrees. A few men came out Sunday in stow hats. This afternoon white clouds lined the horizon, a sign of rain.

That the city of Bendleton is in excellent condition from a sanitary standpoint is the report made by responsible officials following a survey preliminary to the annual clean-up.

Dallas is about completing the installation of a renovated street lighting system which affords lamps at nearly all intersections in the city. The Engineer is glad to announce that local labor exclusively, and local materials as far as possible, have been employed.

The Sheridan Sun draws the deadly parallel, as follows: "Sleds running in Nebraska and lawn mowers running in Iowa and grain sowing in old Yamhill; icebergs in the Dakotas, daffodils and violets in the Willamette valley; blizzards still in the east, robins and larks singing in Oregon. Yea, verily, great is the state of Oregon."

The Tillamook council has decided that in order to stimulate interest in the fire department, it will give to each fireman \$1 per month, based on attendance at drills and fires. It is thought this fee will pay for the clothes the boys may spoil while at fires. Business men, the Herald says, are taking more interest in the fire department and an effort is being made to build it up.

A "forkless dinner" was given by the Latin classes of La Grande high school recently, at which togas, garlands, tunics, and libations were among the many Romanesque accessories. The Observer, in its report, notes that "spoons were used only for eating soup, shellfish and eggs, but the guests showed themselves equal to the occasion and ate with their fingers as gracefully as any Roman noble."

Dallas, Texas, March 25.—Texas will do its share to save the country from a most famine. Of 20,000 men, boys and girls who have entered the contests of the Texas industrial congress for farm products, 1200 are in the hog club. As many more are listed in the various other branches of the live stock industry, but hogs are considered the likeliest money producers.

A circular to the club contestants, telling how to get the best results, says: "Choose a young pig, one recently weaned, whose mother has received the right care, and which is not a runt. If a hog is kept in a dry lot and fed corn only, he will lose the feed money every time. If a hog is given all the slop milk he can drink with an ear of corn each day, half an ear when small, he will grow fast and make the feed money."
