

Dancing on London Highway and in Long Island Surf : Knights of Columbus Convention



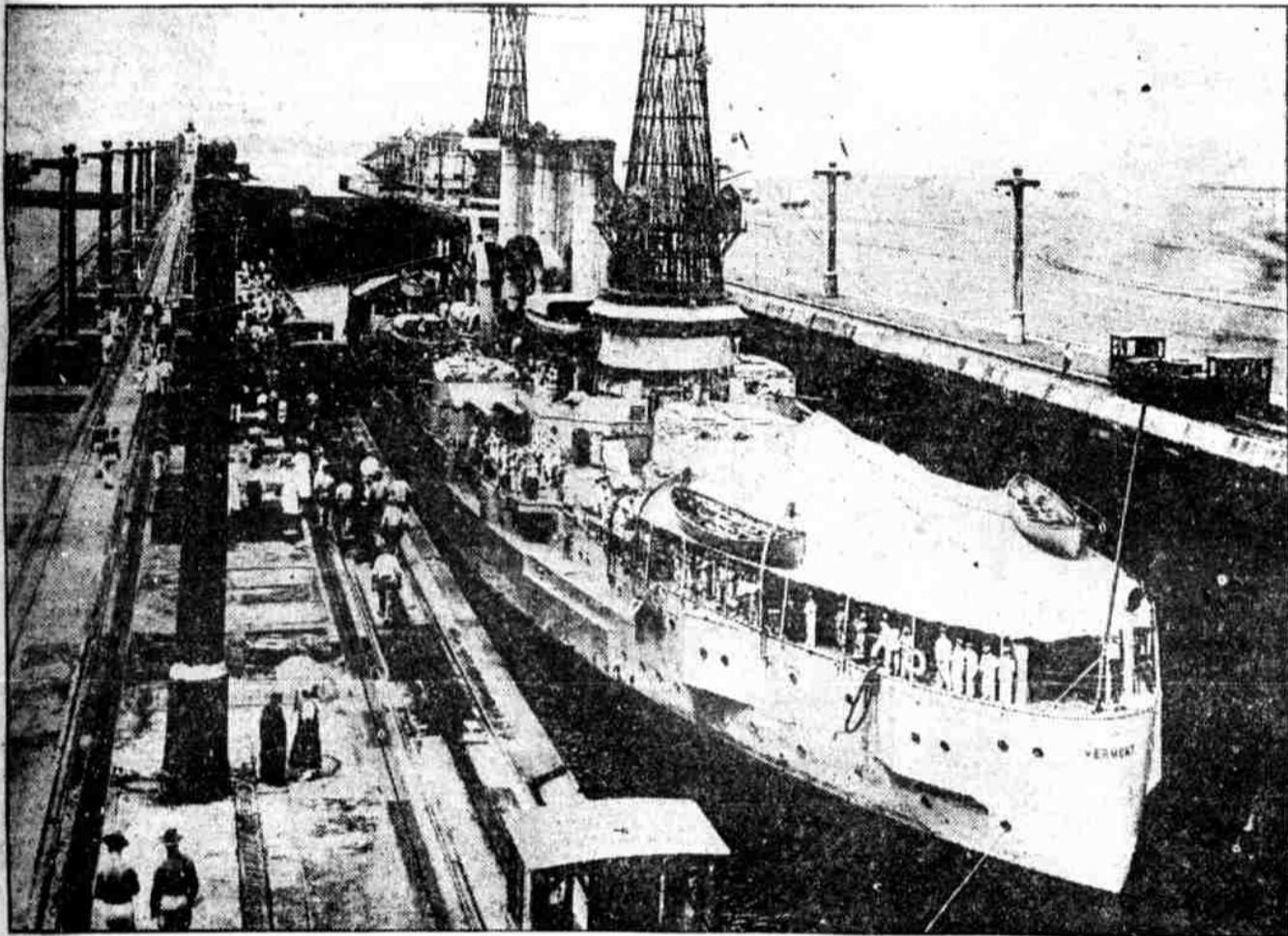
