AIRCRAFT SERVICE

Aeroplanes Have Been Flying Over Vera Cruz Watching Movements

(From the Columbia State.) Among the navy aviators with the American fleet in Mexican waters, is a South Carolinian, P. N. L. Bellinger, junior grade, Lieut. Bellinger with Lieuts. Chevalier, Towers and McVane left Pensacola some days ago with the hydro-plane, aboard the cruiser Birmingham.

The Birmingham is the flagship of the Atlantic fleet torpedo flotilla. She is a third class cruiser of 3750 tons, 16,000 horse power.

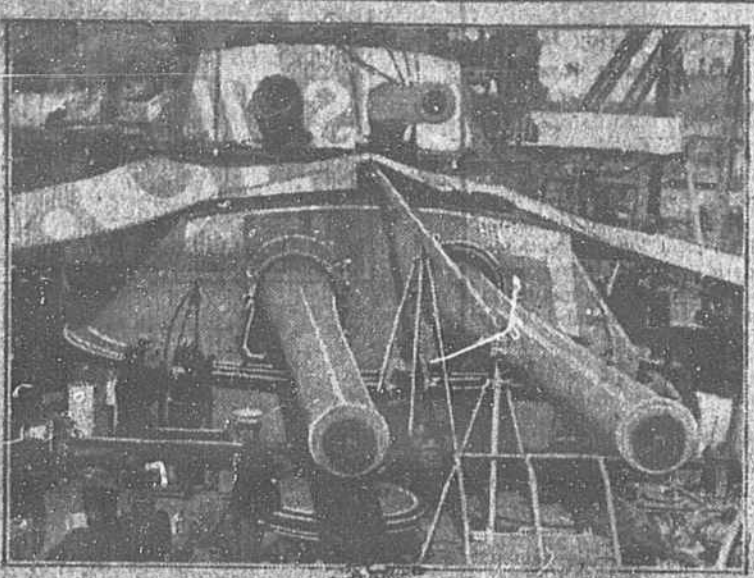
