WOOD PROVES FATAL TO JONES

Herald Building Janitor Dies Sunday Afternoon at Hotel Dieu

Arthur Richard Jones, the negro watchman and head janitor of the Herald building, who was shot by an unknown assassin while on duty early Saturday morning, succumbed to his wounds shortly before 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

While going his rounds early Saturday morning—some shot Jones, the bullet taking effect in the abdomen, shattering also the left hip bone and injuring the spine.

The deceased was married and is survived by his widow, Martha, who now lives in Fort Worth, and two daughters. He was 58 years of age and resided at 412 South Ochoa street. His mother, who lives in Houston, also survives him, and the funeral arrangements will not be made until she arrives.

For over two years the deceased had been the night watchman at the Herald building, and had resided in El Paso for some time. He was well known among the negroes of the city and took a leading part in their affairs. He was a member of the negro Knights of Pythias.

The shooting, which resulted in the death of the negro, can not be accounted for, and the victim would not divulge any reason for the act, if he knew. He claimed to have no enemies in the city and said before his death that he did not know any one who would attempt to take his life.

The day before the accident he had filed suit in the 34th district court for divorce from his wife Martha, who lives in Fort Worth.

No arrests have been made by the police in connection with the shooting.

MARKET INTEREST IN STOCK TRADES

Prices Advance Slightly, but Only on a Few Choice Ones

New York, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Interest in stocks lagged today. With prices generally lower in London trading here with a heavy tone, owing to a continuation of profit taking and lack of outside demand. The course of the market encouraged bear traders to renege their operations and they were able to bring about some reactions.

Prices advanced a bit before noon, but the chief gains were limited to a handful of stocks such as the coalers and the Hill group. Other stocks improved in more sedate fashion and seemed to bring about some reactions.

Lehigh Valley established a new high level for the present movement, touching 18 1/2. Reading showed an important gain of about two points over its previous high, and Consolidated Gas three. Bonds were irregular.

Bull manipulation was suspected for a while when profits were sought the whole lot broke sharply. Lehigh Valley relinquished all but a small fraction of its former advance. Reading dropped back to one-half point over Saturday's close, United States Steel a point, and Union Pacific and Southern Pacific 1/2. A few inactive stocks were lifted materially before the market weakened. United States Rubber rose 1/2, National Biscuit 1/4.

Speculation became very quiet on a trifling rally from the lowest. The recovery brought most of the list to a trifle above Saturday's close. The close was weak.

Governor-elect W. C. McDonald of New Mexico was in El Paso for exactly two minutes Sunday evening. The new governor returned to his home in Carrizozo on the delayed Golden State limited at 7:35 p. m. and left on the north bound Santa Fe train, which he met here by Felix Martinez and Z. L. Cobb, who assisted him in his companioning him to Santa Fe, where he will confer with his political associates at the New Mexico capital.

LIGHT SHIPMENTS STRENGTHEN GRAIN

Corn Turns Sharply Upward With Wheat; Oats Also Climb

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 13.—Lighter world shipments than expected put fresh strength today into wheat. Opening prices were 1/2c lower to 3/4c up. December started at 92 1/2c, an advance of 1/2c to 3/4c to 2 1/2c to 3c, and then rallied to 93 1/2c to 95 1/2c.

The close was strong with December 94 1/2c higher at 93 1/2c. Although Oull, corn turned sharply upward with wheat. December opened a shade to 1/4c to 3/4c down at 62 1/2c but later advanced to 63 1/2c.

The close was steady at 63 1/2c for December, a net gain of 1/4c to 1/2c. Data climbed up from the outset. December started unchanged to 1/2c higher at 47 1/2c and rose to 47 3/4c.

An advance at the yards carried provisions upward as well. Initial sales were a shade to 1/2c to 3/4c dearer, with May \$16.70 for pork; \$3.55 for lard, and \$5.75 to \$5.80 for ribs.

TWO BOYS ARE HELD FOLLOWING THEFT. Clerk Charges Little Mexicans With Rifling Safe in Daylight

Mangel and Eusebio de la Torre, two Mexican boys, brothers, aged 9 and 10 years respectively, are held by the police pending an investigation of the theft of a safe from the corner of Stanton and Overland streets, shortly after noon Monday.

It is charged that the boys, in company with another boy a little older than they, went into the safe at the rear of the store while the clerk was waiting on customers, and secured \$75 therefrom.

The outer door of the safe had been left open and with a cash register key, the inner door was forced, leaving the money drawer exposed.

A clerk employed in the store turned suddenly and chanced to have caught the boys at work. He called policeman Ware from the station across the street and turned the boys over to him.
