

TEMPORARY INJUNCTION HAS NOW BEEN FILED

Case of Electric Planing Mill vs Chickasha Trades Council, et al, Set For Hearing December 13

In the case of the Electric Planing Mill Company, a corporation, vs. the Chickasha Trades Council, et al., and which came on for hearing before Judge Bailey at Duncan last Wednesday, the court issued the following order—which was mailed to District Clerk Callahan from Duncan yesterday afternoon for filing:

"It is ordered, considered, adjudged and decreed by the court that the defendants hereinabove named, and each of them, are hereby restrained and enjoined from interfering by force, violence, intimidation or coercion with plaintiffs business or the use of the product of the plaintiff corporation by such force, intimidation, violence or coercion or from using such force, coercion, intimidation or violence in the preventing of any person, firm or company from purchasing or using material the product of the plaintiff corporation until the further orders of this court; that plaintiff execute bond in the sum of \$250.

It is further ordered that the above case be set for hearing on the 13th day of December, 1909, at 9 a. m. (Signed) Frank M. Bailey, Judge 15th Judicial District of the State of Oklahoma."

"THE PUBLIC BE DAMNED"

Within the past twelve months over fifteen thousand dollars has been expended in the building of handsome residences and otherwise improving residential property, all within one block of the proposed location of the Oklahoma Central depot at Tenth and Chickasha. This part of the city, west hill, has always been considered among the choicest of residence locations. With the advent of a railroad and the necessarily accompanying noise, smoke, dirt, and danger, property in that vicinity will naturally be reduced fifty per cent in value.

Beginning at the corner of Tenth and Chickasha avenue, going west on the south side of the street, Dr. Williams owns a block of handsome residence lots, with the exception of fifty feet. These lots are among the choicest in the city. They would be practically ruined for residence purposes. Across Tenth street, east, J. C. Neal owns a handsome lot, upon which he contemplated erecting a modern home; this idea of course he must abandon. The north side of Chickasha avenue between the right of way and Eleventh street, will depreciate a half in value. Some of the handsomest residences in Chickasha are located on the hill from Tenth street to the city limits. This property will all be damaged irreparably by the location of a depot at this point.

The Express is not now, and never was opposed to any railroad proposition, but when a railroad by virtue of its right of way contemplates not only ruining a valuable school property and entering a choice residence district, the time has come to enter an emphatic protest.

There is no necessity for any railroad ever coming as far south as Choctaw avenue, and public sentiment is such that if it can be legally stopped, it will be done.

Is Chickasha to experience a practical application of that time-honored railroad maxim: "The Public be Damned!" The Oklahoma Central can easily secure a dozen locations vastly cheaper and much more practical for the location of a depot. The hook-worm curve their blue prints show, is not only impractical but would cost an enormous sum of money—money that the Santa Fe or Katy will think twice before spending.

COUNCIL MEETING

Can't Cut Officers Pay As Previously Ordered

The city council held a brief session yesterday afternoon and among other things accepted the bonds of G. A. Heman, for the guarantee of the paving work. Under the paving contract, the paving company gives bond in amount equal to 10 per cent of the cost of paving on each street and payment of this balance of 10 per cent had been withheld until the bonds were accepted; accordingly the final estimates were furnished and the balances paid to Mr. Heman on all the streets paved except Eighth street.

In the matter of changing the salaries of the city attorney, police judge and chief of police, recently ordered, the mayor stated that after making an investigation of the matter was convinced that the salaries of these officers could not be changed during the term for which they have been elected. The matter was referred to the ordinance committee with instructions to consult outside legal advice, this being in harmony with the views of the city attorney since he is an interested party.
