## **GIRL SLAYS BANDIT** AS HE ROBS A SAFI

Police Find Ruffian Under Iron Box With Knife in His Heart.

New York, October 30.—Those policemen of the Harlem stations who, suring the last three years have predicted a sudden and violent end of the career of Frank, otherwise known as "Chick" Moniaco, tasted the pleasures of fulfilled prophecy yesterday, when the man was found dead under an old iron safe, with his arms pinned beneath him and a ten-inch knife in his heart.

Nellie Lenere, twenty years old, in a statement made to an assistant district attorney last night, declared that she had killed the man while he was attempting to rob the safe which belonged to her mother. He had previously cheated her out of \$350, she said, by representing himself as an emissary of a man to whom she had been married, and had beaten and choked her yesterday before attempting to rife the safe.

Moniaco was twenty-four years old, and was known all through the foreign quarter of Harlem as the survivor of a triumvirate which had consisted of himself and "Tough Tong" and "Black Gallucci," both killed within a month, one in a wine snop and the other by a policeman's bullet.


