TWO MEN ENTER PLEAS OF GUILTY

PAIR ACCUSED OF ROBBERY DECIDE NOT TO STAND TRIAL. IMPERATI CASE WILL BE FIRST.

The November term of the Houghton county circuit court which opened here this morning at nine o'clock, will probably be a short one, as the number of criminal cases numbers only fifteen and there are about fifty civil cases.

The morning session today was devoted to the arranging of the calendar for the term and hearing of pleas. Pasquall Imperati, charged with issuing a forged instrument, stood mute. He is charged with securing money on checks issued to two Quincy miners last summer.

Theodore Hamacher and William E. Fisher, charged with robbery, were asked who was their attorney, said they had none.

John Kuehnich, the charge against whom is said with intent to commit great bodily harm less than the crime of murder, pleaded not guilty.

Attorney E. A. McNally, representing Anthony Mublich, charged with violation of the liquor law in keeping open after hours, asked that the case be either continued or deferred until later in the session.

HOUGHTON HIGHS NEARER THE U. P. CHAMPIONSHIP

WIN FROM IRONWOOD BY SCORE OF 5 TO 0 IN CLOSE CONTEST.

Decisive Match Takes Place Next Saturday Against Menominee.

By defeating the Ironwood high school football team on Saturday afternoon at the Hancock driving park, the Houghton eleven took another step towards the upper peninsula intercollegiate football championship.

Saturday's match was a fast and well played contest in which the superior weight of Houghton counted for a good deal, each man averaging fifteen pounds better than their iron country opponents.

The score was 5 to 0 in Houghton's favor, the winning touchdown being made by Norton early in the second half. The goal kick by Worthing failed.

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MOTOR BOAT PILOTS. Inspectors Receive New Construction of Federal Ruling.

Marine inspectors have received notice from the solicitor of the attorney general's office that will place a new construction on the law governing the application for motor boat pilots.

The letter, however, lays particular emphasis on the fact that the entire matter of such applications is left to the discretion of the inspectors and that the new construction does not in any way take responsibility in the matter of granting licenses from the inspectors to whom the application is made.

As the law requires the applications to be made in writing, it is presumed that all the applicant is required to do in the event that he cannot read or write, is to sign his mark.

L'ANSE BAY LUMBER COMPANY.

Machinery at Grand Marais Mill Has Been Purchased by Company.

The L'Anse Bay Lumber company has shipped a crew of men to Grand Marais to take apart the machinery of the sawmill it recently purchased there.

The coming of this plant to L'Anse is the realization of the many dreams in which the residents of that village have indulged the past ten years or more. Ever since the memorable fire which practically wiped the town from the map in 1884, L'Anse has fought stubbornly against reverses.

The mill will employ close to one hundred men and with a virgin forest of 30,000 acres there will be sufficient amount of timber to keep the plant in operation many years.

JEFFERS IS PRESIDENT.

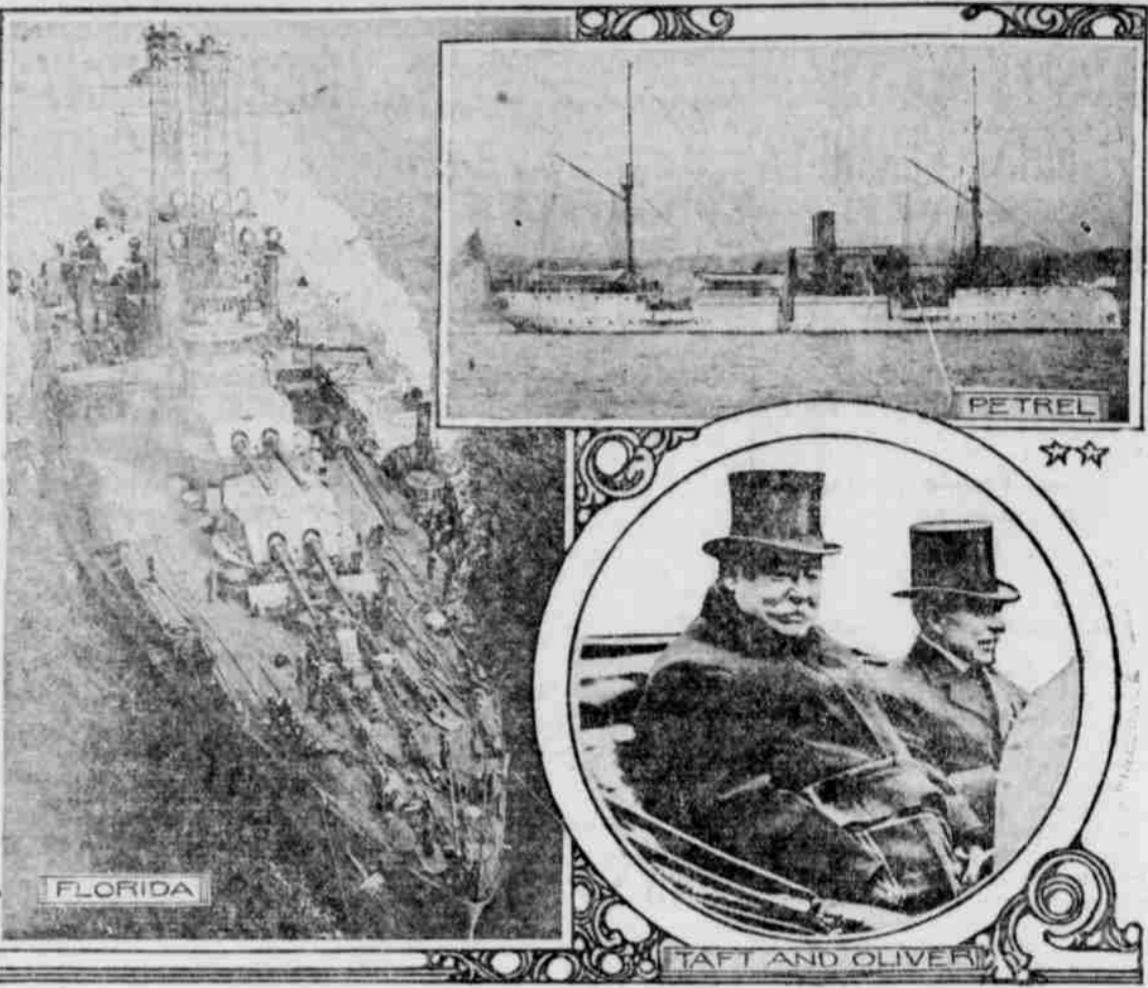
Will Head Michigan High School Oratorical Association.

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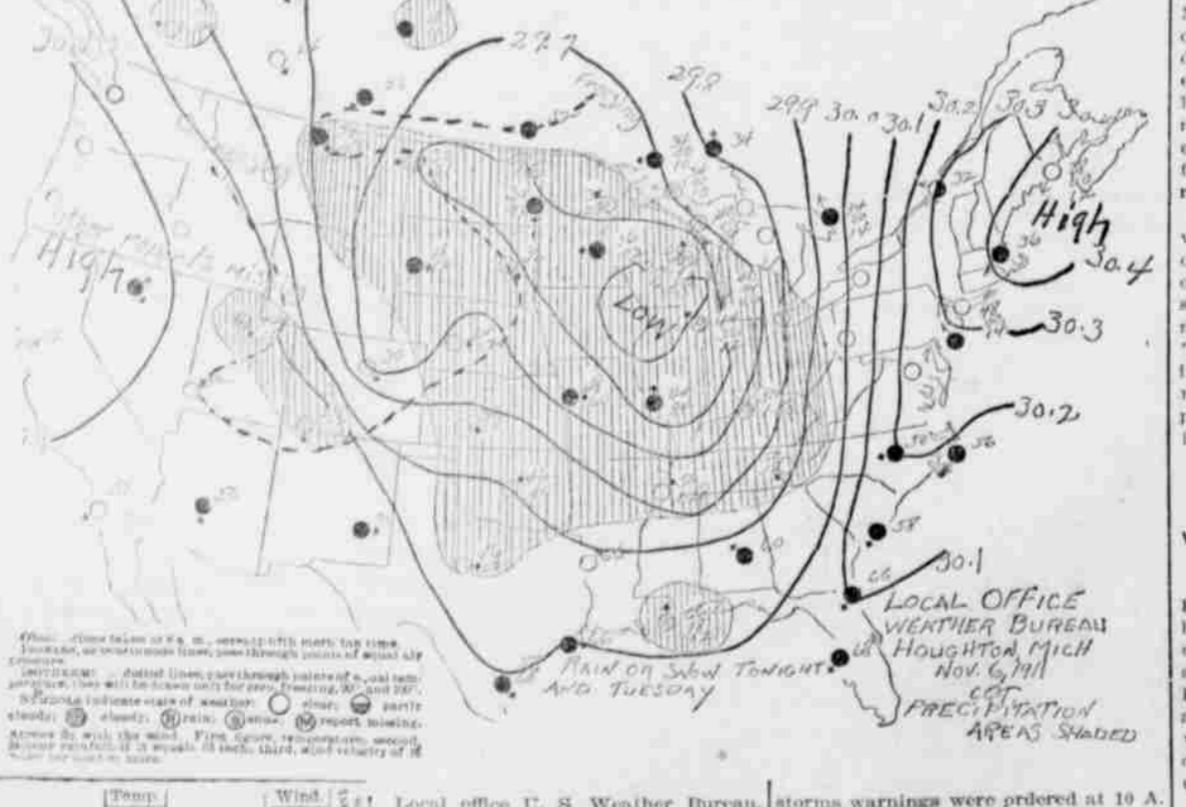

PRINCESS BACON.
