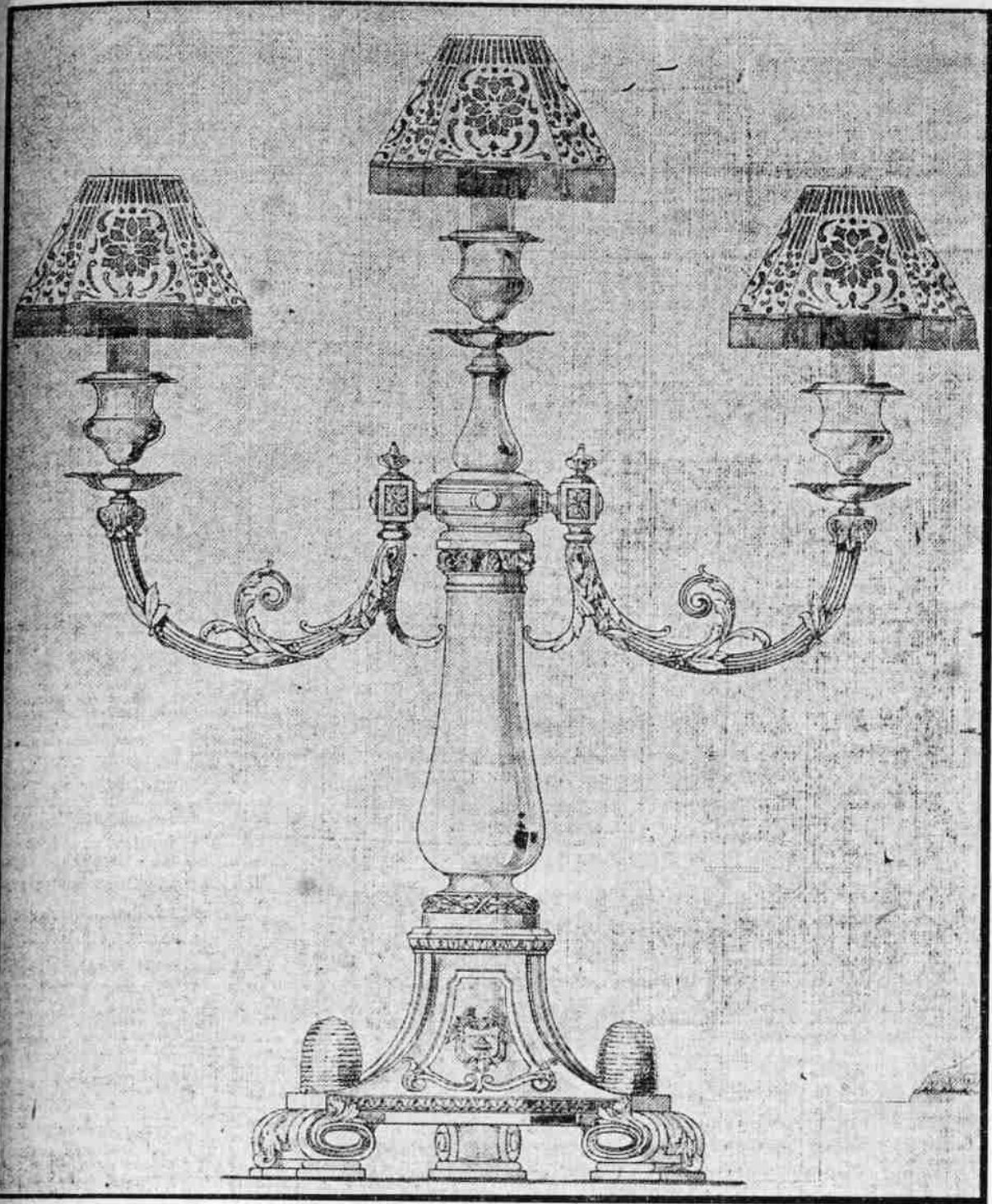
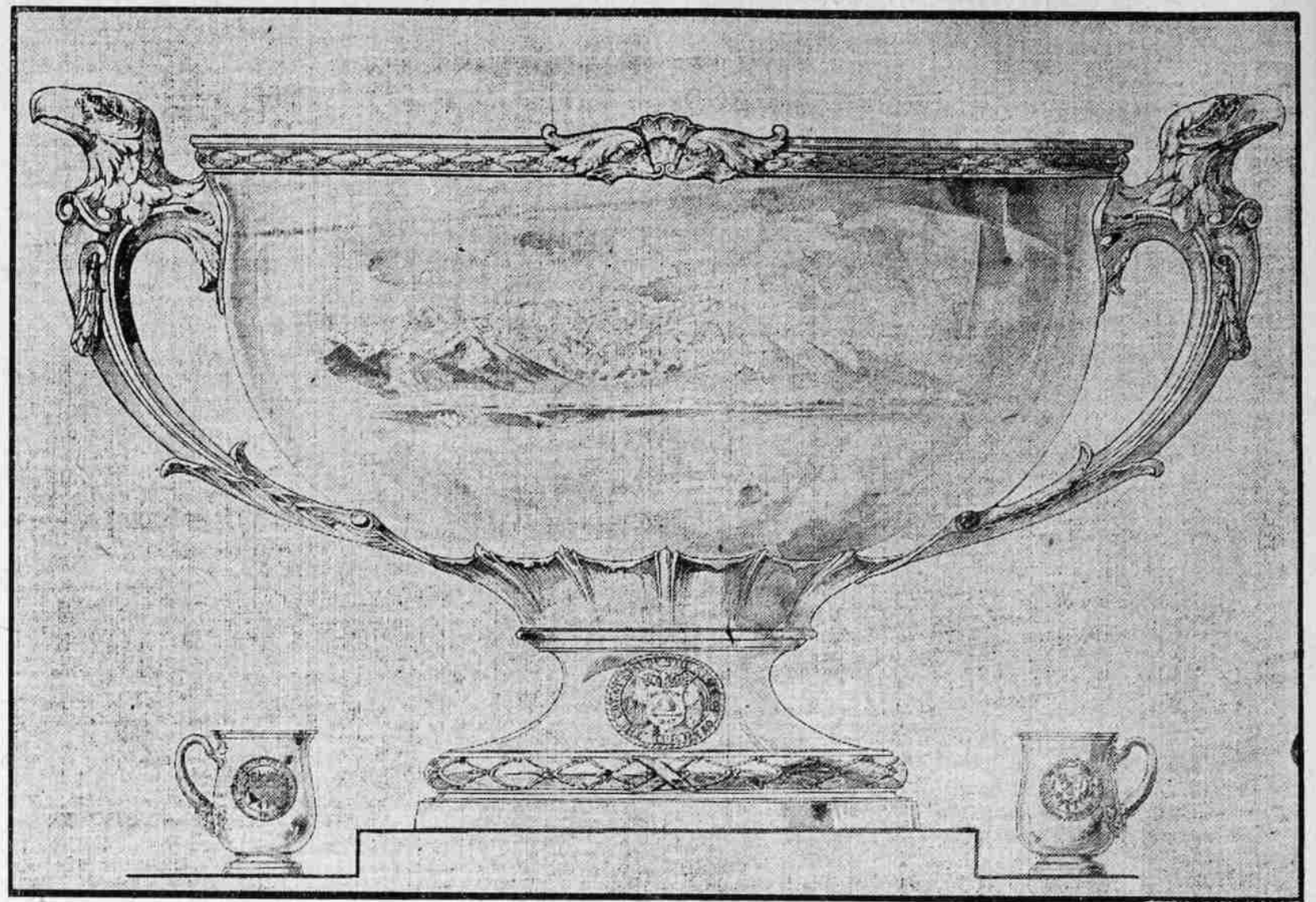


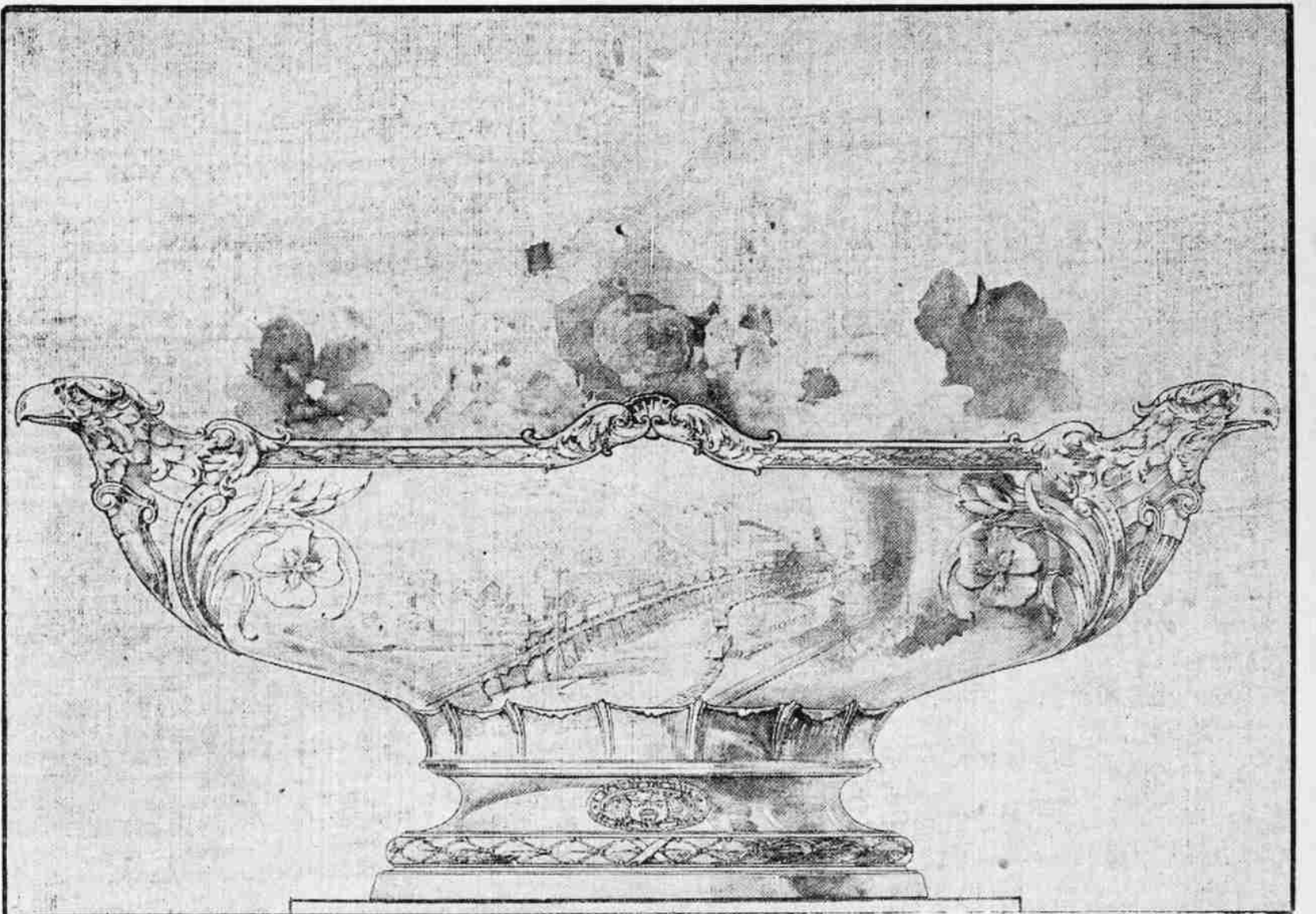
Officers of Battleship Utah Will Dine With Glorious Silver Service Depicting State's Beauty and Resources

Features of Silverware—Gift of Utah to Her Dreadnought

High art in silver will be the feature of the service for the new battleship, Utah. The drawings are on exhibition at the store of the J. H. Leyson company, and they will undoubtedly create widespread interest, owing to the ornate designs and artistic decorations. For weeks the work of gathering the subjects for the decoration and planning the details had been carried on by the Leyson company prior to having the general plans drawn by the Gorham Manufacturing company. While the plans have all been received, the general committee will meet again on July 12, at which time changes can be

adopted in the designs for the decorations of the larger vessels, and any other alterations made. However, the beauty and wide field of the completed plans are so perfect that it is doubtful if any but minor changes will be ordered. Manager C. R. Pearson stated Friday that the set will comprise mostly the large, hollow ware customary for such a gift. Most of the flat ware is provided the battleships by the government, and Utah's gift will, therefore, be devoted to a service of elegant proportions and one that will reflect the greatest credit upon the state. It will be made up of punch bowl and ladle, 24 punch cups, 3 meat dishes, gray

boat and ladle, bread tray, coffee urn, 6 compositors, 12 coffee cups and saucers, 24 sherbet spoons, 2 seven-light electric candelabra, six-piece tea set and tray, vegetable dishes, water pitchers, pepper and salt, salad set, center-piece, cigar humidifier, tureen, 2 goblets, fish set, entree dish covers, 4 candlesticks and fittings, 2 olive dishes, three-piece coffee set and tray, 1 double dish and several pieces of flat ware.

It will be manufactured entirely of Utah silver, and the bullion will be sent on from this city. In the general design the seal of the state of Utah, the arms of the navy, the seagull and the sego lily have been artistically and cleverly worked out into the general theme, but the larger pieces will be elaborately engraved in a lasting memento of Utah, and in this a wise selection has been made of Utah scenes, for on the large pieces will be reproductions of mining, smelting, lake, valley, mountain and city scenery. On one of the bowls, for instance, is the entire view of the Wasatch, from Ship-ler's photograph, and on one of the trays is the picture of the arrival of the pioneers from the Oregon Short Line station painting. In fact, these reproductions will not only be artistic, but they will be unique in their way, and it is said that the whole makes the most beautiful silver service that has ever been manufactured for a similar purpose. Only the sketches can be seen today, but as soon as finished the service will be shown in this city.
