

Society Stars Appear in Pinafore Tomorrow  
Opera Will Be Produced on "Battleship Utah"

MUSIC

Fleet of Boats for the Spectators, Also Boxes Around the Lagoon; Park for Autos Has Been Reserved.

A dark gray sides slipping down into the depths of the lake, the outlines of the rakish hull faithful to its illustrious original, and with its broad deck ready for the tread of the barefooted society bums who will trip hereon the charming dances of "Pinafore" for sweet charity's sake, the miniature of the battleship Utah is complete and ready for the first performance tomorrow night of that most delightful of all operas of bygone days, Gilbert and Sullivan's "H. M. S. Pinafore."

Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday nights the company of charming debutantes and matrons, who have worked so hard the past three weeks to perfect themselves in the roles and choruses of that opera, will repeat Monday evening's performance. The proceeds of the shows will go to the Free Kindergarten and Neighborhood House Association, under whose auspices the spectacle is to be given.

Socially, musically and dramatically "Pinafore" is the event of the coming week in town. This combination of circumstances, together with the personnel of those who are participating in the play, the splendid orchestra that has been gathered and drilled by Squire Coop, and the precision and perfectness with which the presenting company has been drilled by Stage Manager Harry James will be responsible for one of the most interesting and beautiful home talent plays ever given in this city.

Good Seating Facilities.

The facilities and arrangement for the seating of those who will flock to the popular resort the coming four nights to witness the performance are usually thorough. A fleet of boats, a majority of which have already been reserved for the four performances, will take up their positions, each with six occupants, between the ship and the shore. Back of them, arranged round the edge of the lake, are fifty

boxes, each with a capacity for six spectators. Rising from the rear of the boxes is an amphitheater capable of holding over fifteen hundred people. Flanking it on either side are hundreds of chairs and settees.

For those who motor down with friends, a large space has been reserved at the east end of Waadumere for the parking of the automobiles, and for others a two minute car service will be maintained by the street car company until all the crowd has been landed at the resort and returned to town later in the evening.

The opera will be costumed and staged elaborately. Harry James, one of the most expert stage directors in the west, has had charge of the company for the last ten days. Squire Coop, in charge of the music, has worked wonders with his end of the production.

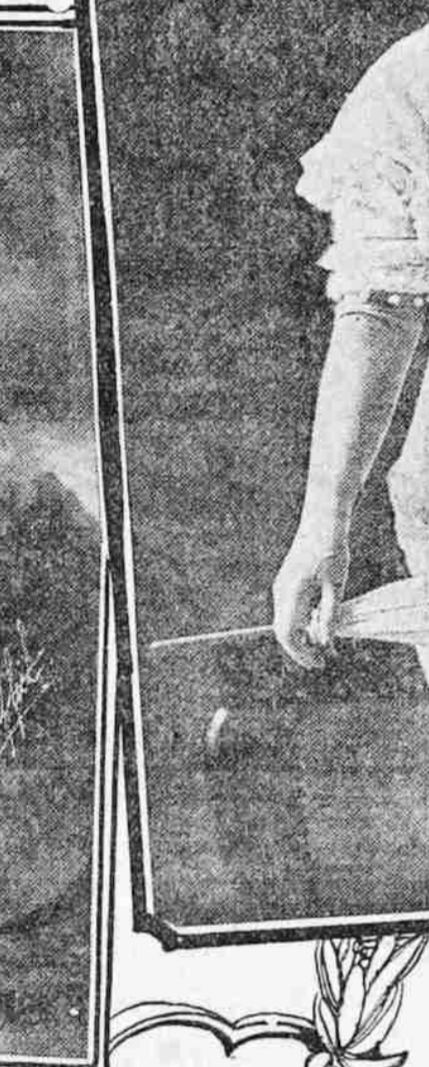

WEEKS of hard and faithful work

fully assure the complete success of the rendition of "Pinafore," which will open at Waadumere tomorrow night for a four night's engagement. Those who have been permitted to hear the late rehearsals and who are competent to judge are unanimous in their opinion that the production will be of such a high order that it will surpass all semi-amateur productions of the season.

The strength of the University of Utah Musical society is joined with that of the most talented maid and matrons of the city's society circles and most of the soloists are well known professional singers of the city. For more than thirty years musical critics have agreed that "Pinafore," the masterpiece of Sir Arthur Sullivan, composer, and W. S. Gilbert, librettist, is the most popular, the most nearly approaching classical lines, and the most enduring of light operas. Its structure shows nothing of the flimsy, trashy, ephemeral form that is so common to the favorites of the season, and yet it is light enough to be thoroughly appreciated by the lover of music who knows nothing of the technique of the art. There are portions of the production that will live as long as melody and harmony are understood, notably Josephine's solo, "The Hours Creep on," and the duet between Dick Deadeye and the captain, and the great concerted finale.

By no means least among the factors that insure the success of the opera is to be reckoned the work of an orchestra of twenty pieces, composed of the best instrumentalists of the city, who leave their strictly professional duties to aid in the cause for which the opera is being given.
