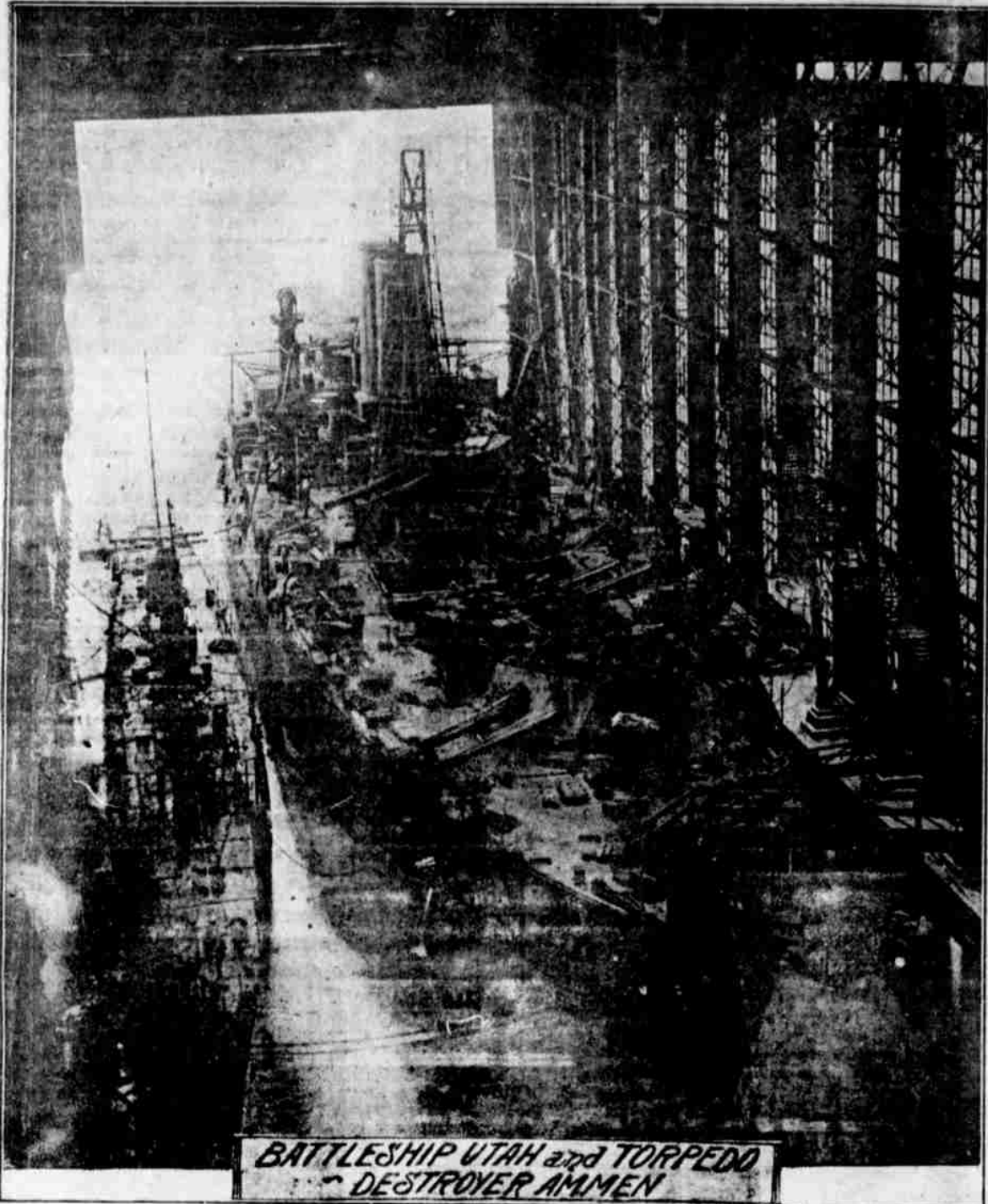


Battleship Utah Is Nearly Ready to Make Her Trial Speed Trips.



BATTLESHIP UTAH and TORPEDO DESTROYER AMMEN

A swarm of workmen are adding the finishing touches to the battleship Utah, Uncle Sam's latest giant of the sea, and within the next two weeks her speed trials will be under way. The torpedo destroyer Ammen will be completed about the same time. Both ships are being built at the yards of the New York Shipbuilding company, Camden, N. J. Before the Utah gets started on her trial trip the launching of the battleship Arkansas, a sister ship, will keep the navy officials busy for a time.

OUR STATE SHIP NEARLY READY

Great Dreadnaught Utah Will Soon be Turned Over to Government.

Washington, Jan. 18.—The dreadnaught will be added to the American navy the latter part of March, when the first class battleship Utah, now nearly complete, at the plant of the New York Ship Building company at Camden, N. J., will be delivered to the government. She will be immediately put in commission and sent to the New York navy yard for a few minor changes.

The full load displacement of the Utah is 23,033 tons. She will be the largest afloat in the United States navy at the present time, although the battleships Wyoming, Arkansas, New York and Texas will be still more powerful when completed.

The speed of the Utah will be 20 1/2 knots.

The Florida, which is the sister ship of Utah, is being built by the government at the New York navy yard. On January 1 the Florida was 86.67 per cent.

CORPORATION TAX IS CONSTITUTIONAL

Argument of Solicitor General Lehmann of the Department of Justice.

Washington, Jan. 18.—For nearly three hours today, Solicitor General Lehmann of the department of justice argued before the supreme court of the United States that the corporation tax provisions of the Payne-Adrich tariff act were constitutional. He told the court that the fifteen cases before it had been brought by shareholders in corporations who objected to the latter paying the tax.

Each of the corporations had expressed an intention to obey the law. Every objection had been raised to the tax, Mr. Lehmann said, that could be raised to any tax possible of being levied under the constitution. Some

of his opponents had gone so far as to claim it was no tax at all, but a mere confiscation of property.

Possibly there was an implied limitation against taxation of the agencies and instrumentalities of state governments, he added. As to the mode of taxation, he said, the only limitations were the apportionment of direct taxes and the making of excise taxes uniform.

The corporation tax, according to the solicitor general, violated none of the limitations. He described the tax as an excise, but said the fact that it made exemptions did not prevent it being uniform. The government had a right to look for more than the revenue to be obtained, according to the solicitor general; it had the right to consider the general welfare of the people in making classifications for taxation.

LONGWORTH BILL ON THE SIDETRACK

House Committee Chooses Dalzell Measure for Permanent Tariff Board.

Washington, Jan. 18.—A permanent tariff board along the lines of the Dalzell bill was agreed upon by the twelve Republican members of the House committee on ways and means today, by a vote of eight to four. The action followed a series of conferences over the various plans for a permanent tariff body, which President Taft has been urging Congress to provide at this session.

Today's action was taken after a long discussion of the two leading plans, the Longworth bill, favored by the administration, and the Dalzell bill.

The Longworth bill provides for a commission of five members at \$7,500 each annually, and the Dalzell bill three members, the chairman drawing \$7,500 and the other two \$7,000 each. The Dalzell bill authorizes the board to investigate anywhere, though the President's consent is necessary to inquiries abroad and the reports are to be made to the President or the House ways and means committee, or the Senate finance committee, whenever called for.

The Longworth bill provides for reports to the President of either House commission before the two committees named, if requested. The Dalzell bill does not provide for the powers of requiring attendance of witnesses,

production of books and papers," etc. The Republicans of the committee are not yet through with the plan and a sub-committee of three was appointed to go over the bill favored and make any changes deemed essential.

No canvass has yet been made of the sentiment of the House, but Republican leaders believe that a bill along the lines of the Dalzell measure would pass the House, but are not sanguine as to the outlook in the Senate. Under no circumstances is any plan favored which would vest in a tariff board of commission the authority even to recommend tariff rates.

RECOVER BODY OF ANOTHER FIRE VICTIM

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 18.—Another body was recovered early today from the ruins of the chamber of commerce building, which was destroyed by fire on January 10, last. It was that of Christy Meents, fireman of the building. Two bodies have now been recovered. Four others are believed to be under the wreckage.
