Norfolk, Va., Jan. 24.—With the battleship Florida leading, seven vessels of the Atlantic fleet steamed out of Hampton Roads on a voyage that will end at San Francisco. The ships were the Florida, Utah. New Hampshire, Louisiana. North Dakota, Vermont, and Washington. Outside the Virginia Capes these ships met Rear Admiral Fletcher on the battleship Wyoming and eight other ships of the Atlantic fleet, and all steamed for Guantanama. Sixteen torpedo hoats and destroyers overlook them before they rounded Cape Hatterss. The fleet will start for Pranama early in March, where they will mobilize for the voyage through the canal.
