#### EVANS ADDS TO HIS LAURELS

##### Chicago Golfer Wins Sixth Western Amateur Title.

Charles "Chick" Evans of Chicago annexed his sixth western amateur gold championship title Friday when he defeated R. E. Knepper, of Sioux City, on the thirty-fourth green with 3 up and 2 to play. Evans was never forced to extend himself, Knepper being somewhat overgrown, having played all last week in the Iowa championship matches which he won and in other western matches.

Knepper took his first and only lead in the eighth but relinquished the honor to Evans again in the tenth. With the exception of these two holes the champion had the best of the match all around, getting in bunkers only three times and against the roots of a tree once, while the lowan was off the fairway frequently and played from the sand traps a dozen times.

Knepper and Harrison Johnson of St. Paul both made the qualifying rounds in 144 for thirty-six holes, thus tying for the low medal score.

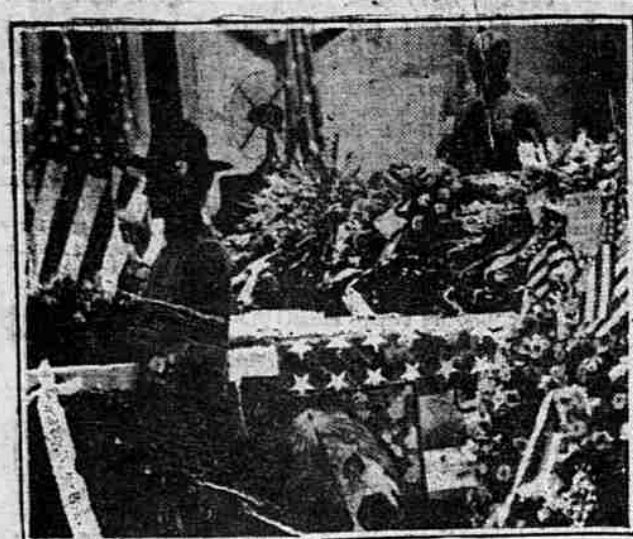
#### Continue Tabernacle Meetings.

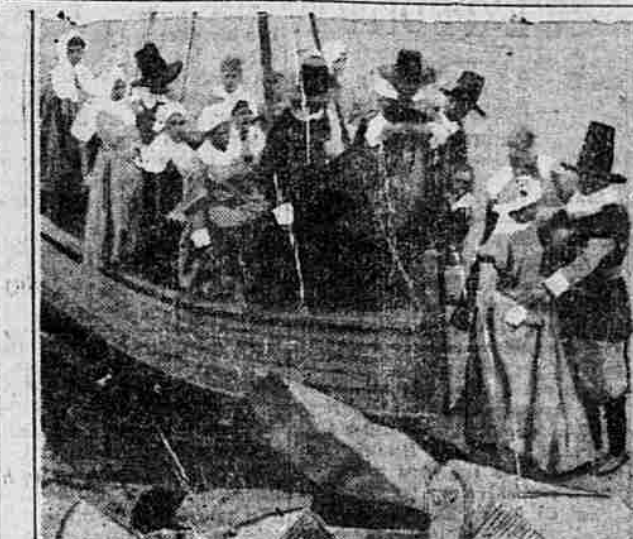


#### FIRST DEAD RETURNED HOME

#### PACIFIC FLEET HAS NEW LEADER



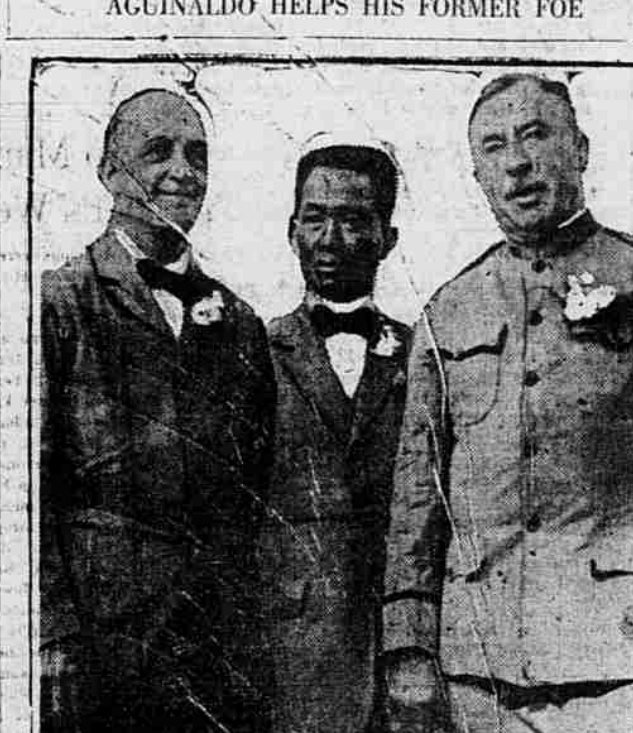
