



A story of the voyage of the U.S.S. Mississippi across the Equator, in the South Seas, and a description of the Initiation Ceremonies by which 1038 officers and men of the Mississippi were converted from Pollywogs to Shellbacks.

Lest our readers who are not familiar with naval customs condemn this ceremony as brutal, it should be said that the initiation is not brutal, but may be boisterous. N JULY 19, 1940, the U.S.S. Mississippi, accompanied by other units of the United States Fleet left the Fleet Base in Hawaiian waters for routine maneuvers through the South Pacific Ocean, south of the Hawaiian Islands, approaching the islands of the South Seas falling in the general classification of American Polynesia.

These islands had for many years lived a lazy existence, with very few people living on them, and some of them entirely uninhabited. They were known to us only through the romantic novels of the South Seas, wherein such names as Palmyra, Jarvis, Christmas, Fanning and Kingman served to identify points at which shipwrecked mariners spent long days, weeks and months hoping to see a rescuing sail being borne through the tropics by the trade winds.

For many years they were considered of such small value that even their ownership was a matter of no great concern. They were nominally under Great Britain, but were used freely by any

one who travelled through them. They were seldom visited by any craft other than fishing vessels from Hawaii.

In 1935 the scene quickly changed. The giant clippers of the Pan-American Airways conquered the Pacific Ocean, and the following year the route to the Orient became a beaten path for the huge silver planes. The United States government was quick to see the potential value of the islands in connection with aviation service to the Antipodes. By negotiation with Great Britain, they were placed beneath the American flag, and even as our voyage started, the first regularly scheduled clipper flight to Australia was in progress above these islands.

Upon leaving the Fleet Base, word went through the ship that during the next few days the maneuvers would carry the fleet across the Equator. The first thought at this news was that at last the ship would for the first time since 1925 come within the domain of Neptunus Rex, the Ruler of the Raging Main.

PREPARATIONS

PREPARATIONS were started immediately for the party. The first step was to find the number of officers and men who had crossed the line before, and to organize the Court from these Shellbacks. It was found that of a total of 1137 officers and men aboard the ship, 23 officers and 76 men were Shellbacks. This gave a total of 99 Shellbacks to initiate 1038 Pollywogs.

Lieutenant Commander Bern Anderson, U.S. Navy, the Athletic Officer of the ship, was directed by the Captain to make the necessary arrangements for a party befitting the Mississippi. He in turn designated Chief Machinist V. A. Cowart, U.S. Navy; W. G. Zuber, C.B.M., U.S. Navy and E. A. Kennedy, CCStd., U.S. Navy as a committee to plan the ceremonies.

This committee then selected committees to handle arrangements; credentials; appointments; and subpoenas. These committees were headed by the following Chief Petty Officers: arrangements, W. G. Zuber, C.B.M.; credentials, A. Maurer, C.Y.; appointments, F. B. Kieffer, C.E.M.; subpoenas, A. Maurer, C.Y. A credentials and subpoena committee consisting of Lieutenant Clanton E. Austin, U.S.N., Lieutenant Carleton E. Mott, U.S.N., and Chief Radio Electrician Robert E. Trapeur, U.S.N., were appointed to pass on the credentials of all Officer Shellbacks and prepare subpoenas for Officer Pollywogs.

The subpoena blanks were prepared by Shell-back J. L. Nuzzo, Chief Printer, U.S.N., with his Pollywog assistants. Pollywog assistants of all the Shellbacks cooperated in caring for the many details connected with the party, and thanks are hereby given for the help given by these men, requiring overtime work by them in many cases.

After leaving the base, a message containing the following information was received from Commander Battle Force:

"THIS FORCE WILL CROSS EQUATOR WEDNESDAY MORNING X COMMANDER BATTLE FORCE WILL MAKE NECESSARY ARRANGEMENTS FOR ENTRY INTO ROYAL DOMAIN OF HIS MAJESTY NEPTUNUS REX."


Immediately following receipt of this message, a note was found in the Daily Work Sheet to the following effect:

"THE FOLLOWING MIXED SHIPMENT OF STORES CONSIGNED TO DAVEY JONES, U.S.S. MISSISSIPPI, WAS RECEIVED FRIDAY FROM THE SUPPLY OFFICER FOURTEENTH NAVAL DISTRICT. STOREKEEPER CONCERNED PLEASE DRAW SAME FROM D-601 TODAY: DIGITALIS PURPUREA, STRYCHNINE SULPHUROUS, NUX VOMICA, CAUSICUNA FRUCTUOSIS, PHYSOSTIGMA VENENOSUM IN CAPSULES, TEN GALLONS MUCILAGE, 20 GALLONS

COAL OIL, 6 QUARTS HOT PEPPER SAUCE, 10 QUARTS CASTOR OIL, 2 BARRELS STICKY BLACK TAR, 20 POUNDS AXLE GREASE, FOUR HIGH PRESSURE GREASE CHARLES THE PAGE OF THE PA GUNS, FIFTY BASEBALL BATS, SIX PAIRS HORSE CLIPPERS, FIFTY PAIRS CRUTCH-LEGS, 3 CASES ADHESIVE TAPE, 6 BLOOD

Publication of this note brought great conster- another bombshell for the Pollywogs: nation to the lowly Pollywogs among the crew. They began to realize the mighty power of the Ruler of the Raging Main, and knew that all of the above material was for the purpose of conducting a proper initiation into the Silent Mysteries of the Deep.

Amusing cartoons, reproduced herein, began to appear around the ship. These cartoons aroused great interest in the party. Several small groups of Pollywogs attempted to form an organization to combat the Shellbacks, but these uprisings were quickly brought to the attention of the Royal Representative on board, and prompt action squelched the rebels.



On the Daily Work Sheet for Saturday there appeared the following message, which had been received via the Starboard Main Injection:

"From: Long John Silver: To : Secret Agent—BB41.

KNOW YE, THAT VAGUE RUMORS HAVE REACHED OUR EARS, THROUGH CHAN-NELS OF OUR LAWFUL EMISSARIES ON TERRA FIRMA THAT THE U.S.S. MISSIS-SIPPI, IN PURSUIT OF HER LAWFUL DUTIES, WILL ASK PERMISSION TO EN-TER OUR DOMAIN; WHEREFORE, WE BID ALL OUR TRUSTY SUBJECTS PREPARE THE MANY POLLYWOGS WITH WHICH THE SHIP IS BURDENED TO DO US HOM-AGE AND TO INSTILL IN THEM A PROPER REVERENCE AND HUMILITY SUCH THAT THEY MAY BE WORTHY TO COME BE-FORE OUR AUGUST PRESENCE. BY HIS EXALTED MAJESTY, NEPTUNUS REX."

The Shellbacks continued their work with more vigor after receiving this word from their beloved King. The subpoena committee worked quietly, compiling a list of the many sins of the Pollywogs in order that His Majesty would have ES, ONE GALLON SHELLBACK OIL, 4 CORK a clear and complete story of the misdeeds of the culprits when they approached His throne.

The Daily Work Sheet for Sunday contained

This message struck terror into the hearts of the Pollywogs, because even though they did not have the Royal Code Book, and therefore they could not decipher the message, the Royal Cryptographer had cleverly revealed to them that His Majesty was aware of the activities of certain of the Pollywog revolt leaders. In the message above will be found the names of Bertucci, GM1c; Chaplain Howe; Alexander, GM2c; Lieutenant Scull; Lentz, Coxswain; Ensign Fike; Ensign James and Van Kammen, SCIC.

A meeting of Shellbacks was held in the Warrant Officers Mess Room, where plans were discussed, questions answered, and final arrangements made.

The Daily Work Sheet for Monday carried another message from the Royal Domain, this message expressing the grave displeasure of His Majesty at the actions of some of the Officer Pollywogs:



YOUR REPORT OF THE ACTIONS OF POLLYWOGS HAS BEEN RELAYED TO HIS EXALTED MAJESTY NEPTUNUS REX. THE PART PLAYED BY POLLYWOGS SHERMAN, SCULL, HOWE, INNES, FAIRFAX AND LEADER IN INCITING THE POLLYWOGS TO REVOLT HAS BEEN DULY RECORDED. THEY ARE HEREBY DECLARED TO BE THE LEADERS OF THE PIRATES. HIS MAJESTY DECREES THAT, AS ADDITION-AL PUNISHMENT AND THAT THEY MAY BE PRODUCED IN HIS PRESENCE WITH THE PROPER REVERENCE AND HUMIL-ITY, THEY SHALL BE HOISTED TO THE YARD TWO HOURS PRIOR TO ENTERING THE ROYAL DOMAIN AS SPECIAL LOOK-OUTS. THEY SHALL BE LOWERED AND GIVEN AN EGG SHAMPOO FOLLOWED BY A BILGE WATER WASH AT HALF HOUR INTERVALS."

Interdivisional boxing and wrestling matches were continued, with everybody enjoying the efforts of the contestants.

Another message was received from the Royal Domain:

"From: Davey Jones.

To: Royal Emissary, U.S.S. Mississippi.

IT HAS BEEN BROUGHT TO MY ATTENTION THAT POLLYWOGS ARE TO BE DROPPED ONLY FROM SIGNAL BRIDGE. THIS IS TOO SHORT A DROP. I SUGGEST DROPPING FROM SKY AFT. MY RECORDS SHOW THAT A POLLYWOG WAS DROPPED FROM MAIN TOP ON YOUR SHIP IN 1921 AND HIT THE QUARTER DECK SO HARD THAT HE WENT ON THROUGH TO A FUEL OIL TANK, WHERE HE WAS FOUND DURING MODERNIZATION IN 1932. IN VIEW OF THIS REQUIRE ALL POLLYWOGS MAKE OUT WILLS."

On Tuesday the Royal Throne really started taking shape. The platform was built, the tank completed and filled with water. Barber chairs were installed, operating tables set up, and every Shellback busied himself in last minute preparations for reception of His Majesty Neptunus Rex.

Suddenly word went through the ship that the Royal Mystery Man had discovered that some of the Royal Equipment had been captured by the Pollywogs. An inventory was made and it was found that the Royal Stocks were missing. Word went out to the Pollywog clan that dire things would happen to them if the missing stocks were not replaced, and soon they were found lying right where they had been captured.



At high noon, on Tuesday, the following message was received from Commander Battleships:

To: Battleships, Battle Force.
Information: Cincus Combatfor.
ALL SHIPS THIS COMMAND MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR THE RECEPTION OF HIS

IMPERIAL MAJESTY NEPTUNUS REX X ALL SHIPS IMMEDIATELY ESTABLISH AN ADEQUATE LOOKOUT TO WATCH FOR DAVEY JONES X DUE TIME SHOULD BE ALLOTTED TO THE INSTRUCTION OF ALL NOVICES OTHERWISE KNOWN AS POLLYWOGS WHO ARE APPROACHING THE DREADFUL MYSTERIES IN ORDER THAT THEIR MINDS AND SOULS AND BODIES MAY BE STEELED TO THE ORDEAL WHICH AWAITS THEM."



The ship was scheduled to perform certain evolutions during the afternoon which made it impractical to establish the watch immediately. However, the Watch List was posted, in preparation for the Pollywog Sea Watch to be set as soon as the evolutions were completed.

The Commanding Officer's Very Special Order, File Extraordinary, a copy of which appears below, was published to all hands:

Reference: (a) The traditions of the Seven Seas.

1. Word has been received both by radio and sound signals that at about 1900 today, the Ambassador Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of His Imperial Majesty Neptunus Rex, His Honor Royal Scribe Davey Jones will board this vessel.

(a) When directed, the Pollywog Sea Watch will be set. This watch to be in accordance with instructions which have been issued to the Pollywogs comprising the

(b) The Officer of the Deck shall keep a sharp lookout and report to me on the quarterdeck by megaphone when the party is sighted.

(c) The ship will be slowed to allow boarding by Davey Jones and his party. After the ship has been

hailed, and Davey Jones has ordered the ship to heave to, searchlights will be played on the hawse pipe. When the searchlights are lighted, the Marine Guard and Band will render honors.

(d) The Junior Officer of the Deck shall be sent to the forecastle to receive the Royal Scribe and conduct him to the bridge, then to me on the quarterdeck. The Pollywog Sea Watch will then be secured.

(e) When Davey Jones has reached the boat deck, on his way to the bridge, assembly will be sounded, and all hands will be marched aft by divisions for Massed Formation.

- (f) Davey Jones will present to all Officers and Chief Petty Officers the subpoenas ordering them to appear before the Royal Court. Subpoenas for all others will be delivered to the Division Officers who will be responsible for their safe delivery.
- (g) After presenting the subpoenas, Davey Jones will return to the Sea whence he came.
- (h) When Davey Jones has left the quarterdeck, the divisions will return to their Division Parades for distribution of subpoenas, and will then be dismissed.

The above formalties are necessary in order to please and placate His Majesty's closest friend, adviser and High Counsellor, the Royal Scribe Davey Jones.

- 2. The second Pollywog Sea Watch will be set at 0645 tomorrow. This watch will be made up according to watch list furnished by Davey Jones when he comes aboard this evening.
- 3. His Imperial Majesty Neptunus Rex, Emperor of the Deep, will board this vessel at or about 0800, to-morrow.
- (a) Breakfast will be served to all hands at 0630, and quarters will be sounded at about 0745. All Divisions will be at Massed Formation Aft at 0800.

(b) The ship will stop at 0800 to allow boarding by His Majesty and Court. They will come aboard via the hawsepipes.

- (c) The Junior Officer of the Deck shall meet His Majesty on the Bow, and escort Him and His Court to the Quarterdeck, coming on to the Quarterdeck on the Starboard side.
- (d) As the Royal Court reaches the Quarterdeck, Full and Most High and Royal Honors will be rendered by the Marine Guard and Band. Ten Side Boys will be used.
- (e) His Majesty will then assume charge of this vessel and all persons herein shall strictly execute his commands under pain of his displeasure. The Royal Standard will be broken at once. The Royal Court will proceed to the forecastle and take their stations. A signal for all Pollywogs to report to the forecastle will be sounded by a Royal blast from the Royal Whistle of the Royal Chief of Police.
- (f) The uniform for quarters will be the uniform of the day, and the officers will wear side arms. The uniform for initiation will be optional. All hands are cautioned not to have watches or valuables in their pockets.
- (g) The initiation line will form on the boat deck, and all hands will surrender their subpoenas to the Royal Scribes for checking off. The Royal Scribes will retain the subpoenas until after the ceremony is finished, at which time they will be returned to their owners.
- (h) Officers will be initiated first, followed by the Chief Petty Officers, then by the crew.
- 4. Tomorrow is hereby declared a holiday.

- 5. On that date all Shellbacks will be relieved of watch and duty during the hours of the ceremony.
- 6. All hands are warned to have their subpoenas with them when they enter the initiation line.
- 7. It is particularly dangerous for Landlubbers to flirt with the Princess, or worse still, with the Queen. The Royal Baby must not be teased.



Ensign C. F. Palmer (SC), U.S. Navy:

Take station on port side of forecastle, announcing every ten minutes "I will gladly pay Shellbacks Special Money." Uniform, white shirt, black bow tie, cocked hat, sneaks, no trousers. Binoculars.

LIEUT. (JG) R. S. THOMPSON, U.S. Navy:

Take station on starboard side of forecastle, announcing every 10 minutes "I repent my disrespect to Shellbacks." Uniform, same as Ensign Palmer.

GUNNER R. T. LEADER, U.S. Navy:

Take station in eyes of ship; every 5 minutes call out "I want a sandwich." Uniform, breastplate, diving underwear, watch cap, web belt, canteen.

PAY CLERK H. G. COCKE, U.S. Navy:

Take station in eyes of ship, keeping record of the Gunner's requests. Uniform, baker's cap, bath robe, skivvies, medals, no shoes.

Ensign G. C. Mendenhall, U.S. Navy:

Take station at incinerator. Report every 10 minutes "No smoke." Uniform, full dress baker, white

LIEUT. G. W. LEGWEN, U.S. Navy:

Sitting down atop No. 1 Turret, announcing every ten minutes "No signal on 500." Uniform, white trousers, no shoes, white shirt, blanket, head set over ears.

R. E. TAYLOR, CQM, U.S. Navy:

Take station in starboard bow. Take and report soundings every ten minutes, reporting "No bottom at three." Uniform, white trousers, dungaree shirt, flat hat, neckerchief.

Take station on top of wildcat. Uniform, white sheet, skivvies, no shoes. Wear sign marked "Mahatma Ghandi" and carry bottle marked "Goat Milk."

All hands were soon on the top side watching the Sea Watch perform their duties, and considerable enjoyment was had by all but the watch standers, and even they could see the humorous side of it. Of all the Pollywog Watch standers, probably the outstanding performance of duty was rendered by Doctor Gross, who carried his bed pan and duck, and reported every five minutes that all bottoms were dry.

At 7:45, quarters were sounded for the crew to assemble aft, and preparations were made to receive His Majesty. Shortly after 8:00, the Equator was crossed, and almost immediately the ship was stopped to allow boarding by His Majesty and His Court. They came aboard ship over the bow, and came down the port side of the forecastle, then through the casemates, and to the Quarter-deck via the starboard side. As His Majesty reached the Quarter-deck, he was given Most Full, High and Royal Honors. Ten sideboys, a full guard and band, with the Marine Guard prostrating themselves on deck as in a Queen Anne Salute, the Royal Party passed them. The King received 6 ruffles and flourishes, followed by "There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight."

The Royal Chiefs of Police led the way, with His Majesty walking alone. He was followed by the Royal Admiral escorting the Queen, the Royal Aide escorting the Princess, the Royal Baby with two nurses, the Royal Attendants, the Royal Maids, the Royal Judges and Prosecuting Attorneys, the Royal Navigator, the Royal Astrologer, the Royal Chef, the Royal Architect, Long John Silver, and the remainder of the party.

Upon reaching the Quarter-deck, the Captain welcomed His Majesty and His Court to the ship. The King thanked the Captain for his welcome, and expressed his pleasure at seeing the Captain and his trusty Shellbacks again. The Captain then turned command of the ship over to His Majesty, who turned to the Royal Admiral and told him to take charge of the ship, to keep her on her present course and speed, and to take no orders not emanating from the throne. The Royal Standard, a white skull and cross bones on a black field, was then broken at the main, and His Majesty ordered the Royal Court to repair to the forecastle, to receive the Land-


