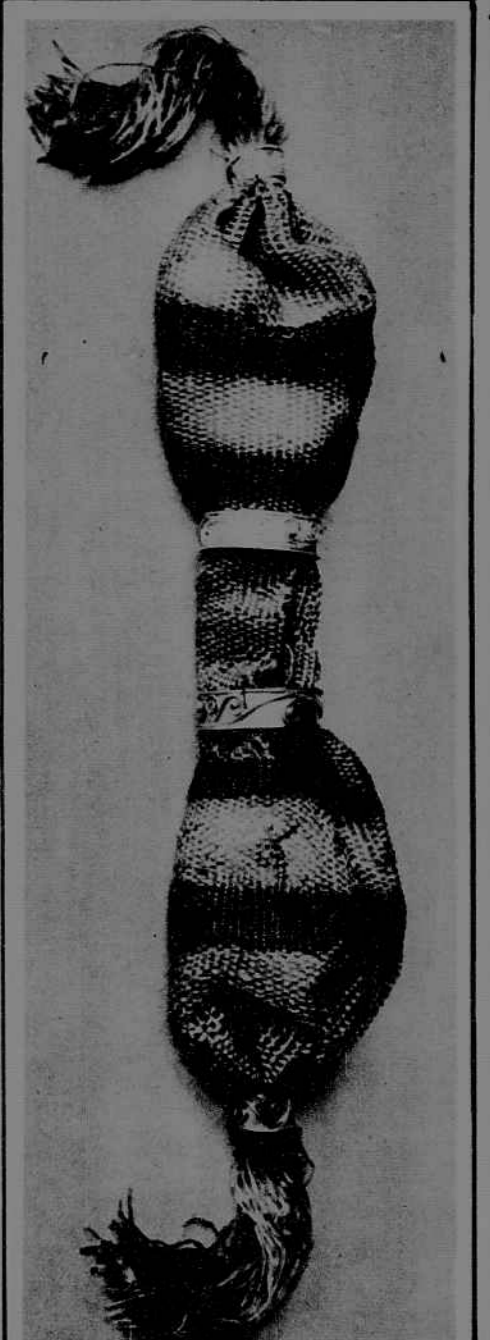

O'Brien, who was on the bridge at the time and did not leave his ship until the water was up to his shoulders, was responsible for the rescue of the thirty-two men saved out of seventy-two.
