

"The cane generally shows good growth," he said, "and the outlook is encouraging. The mill is in excellent shape and I am satisfied with it, though it is small. The railroad is in bureaus, chiffonler, rockers, mosquito good condition. A few ties that were nets, showing the effect of age were replaced with new ones, but there was nothina else needed at this time.

"We will cut less cane on the plantation than was anticipated for the reason that we prefer to let that, which under ordinary circumstances would be cut in August, get the benefit of the good growing weather of September and October. The results will be better in 1908. We will extend slowly and carefully. If Kona has a drawback it is in its lack of transportation facilities. We hope to secure this through the railway we have planned."
