

BRISTOW MAKING RED HOT CAMPAGIN

Plays Aldrich and Cannon and Denounces Republicans Who Favored Payne-Aldrich Bill.

SHOWS UP RUBBER TRUST

Duty on Manufactured Rubber Increased 5 Per Cent. Prices to Consumer Raised 25 Per Cent.

Appleton, Wis., Aug. 9.—Playing Aldrich and Cannon, denouncing those Republicans who favored the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill, and advocating the creation of a tariff commission with sweeping powers, so that schedules on specific articles may be changed as soon as proof exists that they are wrong, Senator Joseph L. Bristow of Kansas delivered here tonight the second speech of his whirlwind campaign through Wisconsin in the interest of La Follette and in the cause of insurgency.

A large portion of the senator's address was devoted to the tariff, and in this connection he referred to the rubber and lead schedules in particular. "Under the leadership of Aldrich and Cannon," he said, "instead of revising the tariff as was promised, duties were left on the free list. The advance was made after the bill came to the senate, by the senate committee on finance, of which Senator Aldrich is chairman. The new tariff bill became a law Aug. 5, 1909. In September it was discovered that the organization of a rubber trust was being consummated with a son of Aldrich as the executive head.

"Rubber goods immediately increased about 25 per cent in price to the consumer and in three months and four days after the completion of the organization of the company, dividends aggregating 18 1/2 per cent were declared on preferred stock, a large portion of which is held by Aldrich himself."

"The speaker declared the stability of the government will be tested at the coming primaries, the most important in the history of the nation. "The Republican party cannot exist," he said, "if it becomes subservient to the people who seek to, and thus far have succeeded in controlling it, and the fall of the government is imminent unless this battle between the masses and the interests, the majority and those prompted by greed and avarice, is won by the former."

PRESIDENTIAL BOOM FOR SENATOR BAILEY

Galveston, Tex., Aug. 9.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey was given a monster demonstration, which opened here today. The demonstration came when Clarence Ousley, temporary chairman, in his address sounded the keynote declaring that the convention should reaffirm the tariff plank of the state platform of 1896, which was a declaration in favor of a tariff for revenue only, saying that this would be "fresh encouragement to that matchless statesman, whose name it is hardly necessary to call."

Mr. Ousley had previously said that Texas should send a message to the Democracy of the nation, and Senator Bailey said something of the sort when he addressed the convention after the demonstration. In the meantime, his friends in the convention have been acclaiming him as the party candidate for president in 1912.

CONFERENCES AT SAGAMORE HILL

Their Renewal Taken to Mean Col. Roosevelt Will Engage More Actively in Politics.

PINCHOT WILL BE A VISITOR

Senator Bourne of Oregon Has Long Talk About Political Situation.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 9.—Theodore Roosevelt spent this evening talking politics with William Loeb, Jr., collector of the port of New York. Tomorrow he expects to have a conference with Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester, and James R. Garfield, ex-secretary of the interior.

For the last two weeks there have been no political visitors at Sagamore Hill, and the renewal of conferences is taken as an indication that the ex-president may be preparing to engage more actively in political affairs.

One of the principal objects of Mr. Pinchot's coming visit, it is believed, is to acquaint Col. Roosevelt with public affairs, especially conservation, which is to be one of the topics discussed by the former president on his western trip.

TALKS WITH BOURNE

New York, Aug. 9.—Theodore Roosevelt spent the day at his editorial office in this city. Senator Jonathan Bourne of Oregon met him by appointment.

"Was your talk with Col. Roosevelt about politics?" the senator was asked. "Not in the ordinary acceptance of the word," he replied, "yet, if successful in my mission, the result will be of the utmost importance."

"I explained to Mr. Roosevelt how Oregon, through her initiative and referendum, direct primary, corrupt practices and recall laws has evolved, adopted and demonstrated the most effective form of popular government known to the world."

"Col. Roosevelt's indorsement is not essential to the ultimate success of the cause, but believing that he has the same confidence in the honesty and intelligence of the people that they have demonstrated they had in him, and appreciating his prominence before the world, I realize that his advocacy will accelerate the adoption of similar laws in other states. This was the mission of my call."

"What did he say?" "You will have to ask him." Col. Roosevelt after the senator's departure said he was greatly interested in his visitor's recital and was already on record as favoring progressive legislation.

Portland, Or., Aug. 9.—President Taft today telegraphed his sorrow at the death of Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Portland Oregonian. The message reads as follows:

"Executive office, Beverly, Mass., Aug. 9.—I learn with deepest sorrow of the death of my good friend, Harvey W. Scott. His service to his country by advocating the cause of sound money at a time when that cause had comparatively few friends cannot be over-estimated and the nation owes him a debt of gratitude for his patriotism and courage."

MILLION DOLLAR LUMBER FIRE IN BOSTON

Boston, Aug. 9.—A loss of upward of one million dollars was caused tonight by a fire in the wholesale lumber district. Starting from an unknown cause, the lumber yards of Blacker & Shepard, the blaze reached such magnitude that a general alarm was sounded in this city since 10:25—followed within 10 minutes of the first alarm. The fire destroyed ten million feet of lumber and five brick buildings. The buildings were a three-story tenement, four wood-working factories and the Boston fire department repair station.

The experimental banks will be located in smaller cities, in order to perfect the system, before an attempt is made to open up metropolitan branches.

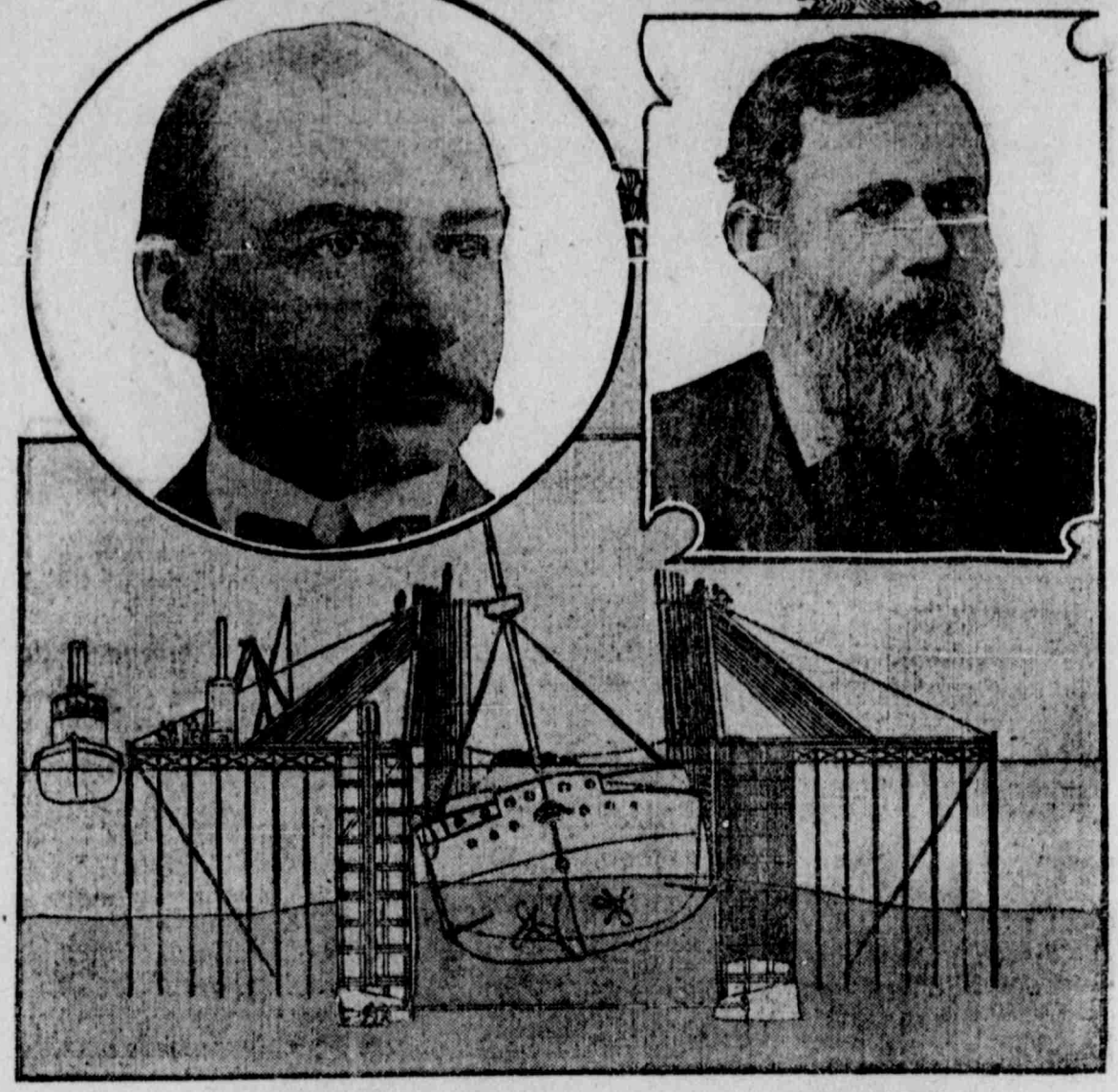
It is hoped that the experimental banks may be in operation by Oct. 15. Mr. Hitchcock and the president, it is said, also talked generally of the political situation.
