NEW STATE HEALTH CAMPS OPENED

Good Air and Food Banish Disease From 225 Wan City Children USE PREVENTIVE PRINCIPLE

At the base of the Blue Ridge Mountains, near Hamburg, Pa., a State health camp, the first ever established, has just been opened for some 225 undernourished children...

Six specialists, eight nurses, nineteen counselors, equipment including a playground and forty-one tents and the leadership of Dr. John D. McLean, State Deputy Commissioner of Health...

Thin little arms and legs flying, eyes bright in their pale, pointed faces, the children came running down from the dining room, their canteens under their arms.

They were all children who had been shown in school examinations to be undernourished or failed in preventive medicine. These children are all under part, and therefore, predisposed to tuberculosis.

Every minute of every day is occupied. This not only prevents the children from becoming homesick, but it is a part of the important features of the camp, according to Miss Agnes O'Halloran, chief of the nursing division.

Particular attention is given to the diet of the children. "Every child must have fresh fruit for breakfast," said Dr. McLean. "We pasteurize the milk in our own plant and it is under daily laboratory inspection."

During rest hours some of the children remain quietly on the veranda, while others tossed about, and one energetic child bounced up and down, chanting under her breath, "Can't I get up now? Can't I get up now?"

As she lay there her hand stole out from under the cover and stroked the side of the tent. "I knew there were had big tents like this one—and the mountains, too, I like camps," she said very positively.

Dr. John Leavelle, of Philadelphia, is the child expert of the camp. Joseph Stoelcher, of Reading, the nose and throat specialist; Dr. Walter Lee, of Philadelphia, the bone and joint specialist; Dr. Charles Hollister, the dentist; Miss Vera Mitchell, the dietitian; Miss Agnes Hollister, head of the State nursing division, is in charge of the children, and Miss Leona Mitchell is the oral hygienist.

Danny Cogan is the physical director and Miss E. Marie Cantner the recreational director. Folk dancing, volleyball, basketball, story-telling and games of all sorts are included in the recreation, as well as exercises on the playground apparatus.

Watch Children for Year At the end of the month a final examination will be made of each child and a report of his condition sent to the medical examiner in his district with further recommendations, if necessary, for corrective exercises. A report also will be sent to the parents. Officers of the State Health Department will make investigations to see whether the recommendations are being followed with success throughout the year.
