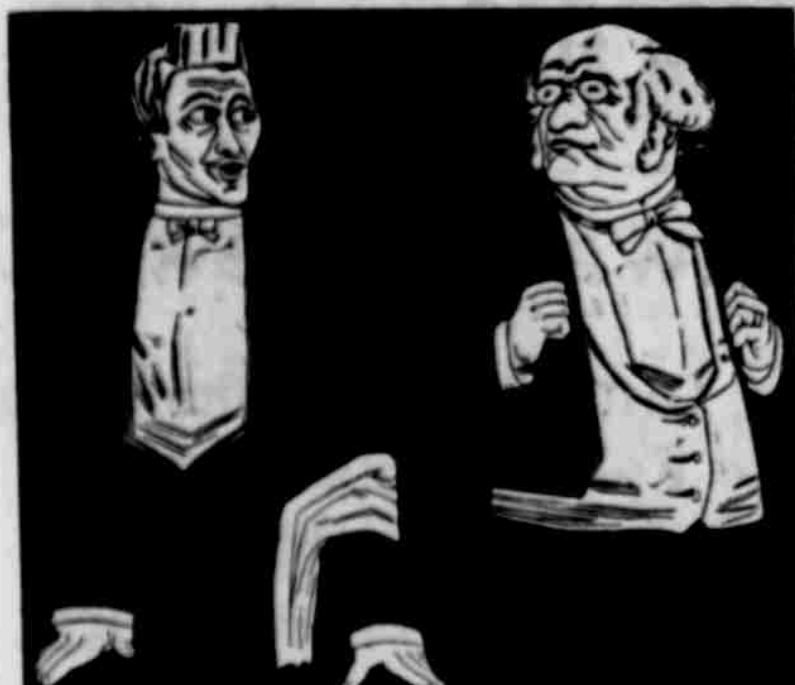

Charter Committees of
The Republicans.

MUNICIPALITY LIMITS

Question Raised as to Whether City
Should Take in all of
Oahu.

The charter committee of the Republican party met last evening and adopted the following report presented by W. O. Smith, chairman of the committee appointed to report upon the scope and method of procedure in the work of framing a charter for the municipality of Honolulu:

Col. J. H. Fisher, Chairman General Committee of the Republican Party.—Upon the Subject of Municipal Government for Honolulu.

First—That the scope of the work be confined to municipal government for Honolulu.

Second—That a committee of five or seven members be appointed by the general committee to prepare and submit a draft of charter or act of incorporation for the city of Honolulu, with power to employ such assistance as may be found necessary.

Third—That a committee of five be appointed to collect literature upon the subject of municipal government, for the use of the general committee.

Fourth—That a finance committee of five be appointed.

Fifth—That a committee of five be appointed to report statistics as to the present cost of the government of Honolulu, showing the cost of maintaining the public school system, public health and sanitation, police department, public improvements and such other details as the committee shall deem meet; also to report upon the public revenue derived from the city.

Sixth—That the said committees report at each meeting of the general committee.

Seventh—That the general committee meet on Tuesday and Friday evenings of each week at 7:30 p. m.

The report was taken up section by section, and the discussion was lengthy, especially upon the first recommendation. Chairman Smith felt that the scope of the work should be confined to forming a municipality for Honolulu alone, divorcing it from the Island of Oahu as a whole. A city government for the whole Island would be too unwieldy. There should be a city and a county government, if at all. P. L. Weaver wanted to avoid Territorial, county and city officers and expensive payrolls. Three sets of officers would be difficult to watch. T. McCants Stewart wanted to leave open the matter of whether the municipal boundaries should be confined to ordinary city limitations or be co-extensive with the Island, and make it one—the city and county of Honolulu. In this manner the city would get the benefit of the taxes derived from the plantations. W. O. Smith thought, if municipal government was to be established, the experiment should be tried upon the city alone. A. V. Gear did not want the hands of the committee tied as to boundaries. J. G. Pratt said the county and city government should be one, citing Wyoming as an authority, and do away with a duality of officers. Stewart made an amendment as follows: "And that the boundaries of Honolulu be left for future consideration." This and the section were carried.

The number of members of the charter committee in the section was changed by striking out the word seven.

Section 5 passed with an amendment that the report should take effect in the other districts of Oahu outside of Honolulu.

The first committee was elected by ballot as follows:

Charter Committee—W. O. Smith, chairman; George A. Davis, T. McCants Stewart, J. G. Pratt, A. V. Gear, Statistics Committee—E. A. Mott-Smith, chairman; J. H. Boyd, C. Bolte, W. R. Sims, F. P. T. Waterhouse.

Literature—P. L. Weaver, chairman; J. L. Kaulukou, George W. Smith, Ed Towse, S. K. Ke-ke.

Finance—L. L. McCandless, chairman; J. A. Kennedy, E. O. White, J. A. Gilman, Enoch Johnson.

The charter committee will meet this afternoon at 2 p. m. in the office of G. A. Davis.

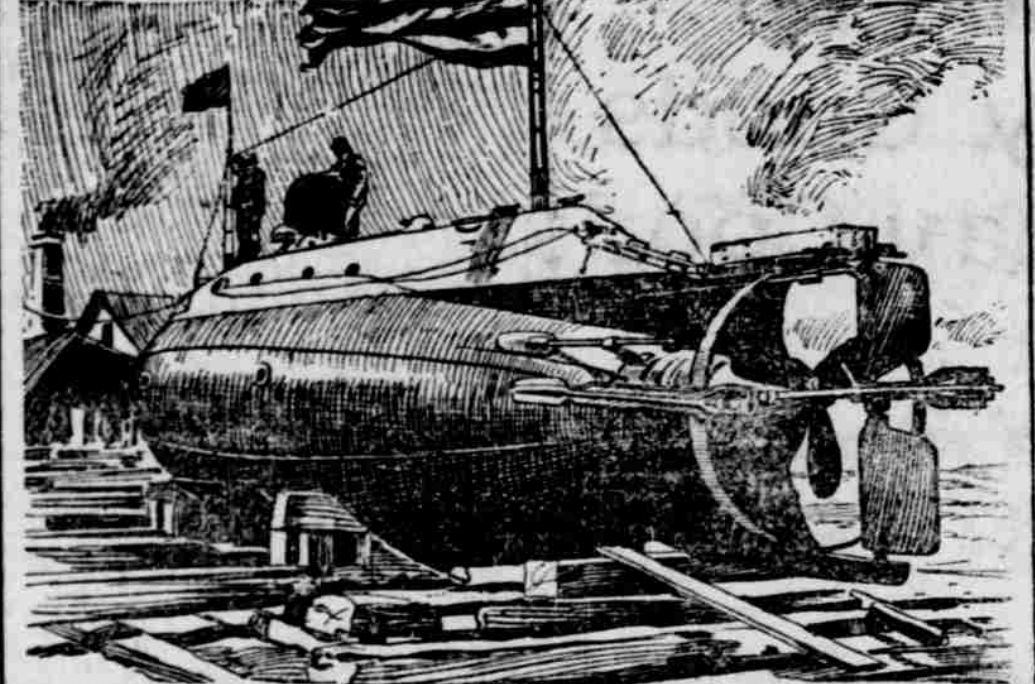

THE HOLLAND SUBMARINE TORPEDO BOAT.

During the past few years the nations of the world have been paying especial attention to the mastery of the sea and building great navies. This has resulted in the construction of many powerful battleships, of which the Oregon, the Kentucky and the Wisconsin are magnificent types. To combat these great engines of war, naval genius has lately been devoted toward producing small, swiftly moving craft, from which destructive missiles



could be hurled at the larger war vessels. As a result various types of torpedo boats have been constructed, of which the Holland submarine torpedo boat is unquestionably the most successful. This was demonstrated in the recent naval maneuvers off Newport, when it was shown that in actual warfare the Holland could have destroyed the most powerful battleship.
