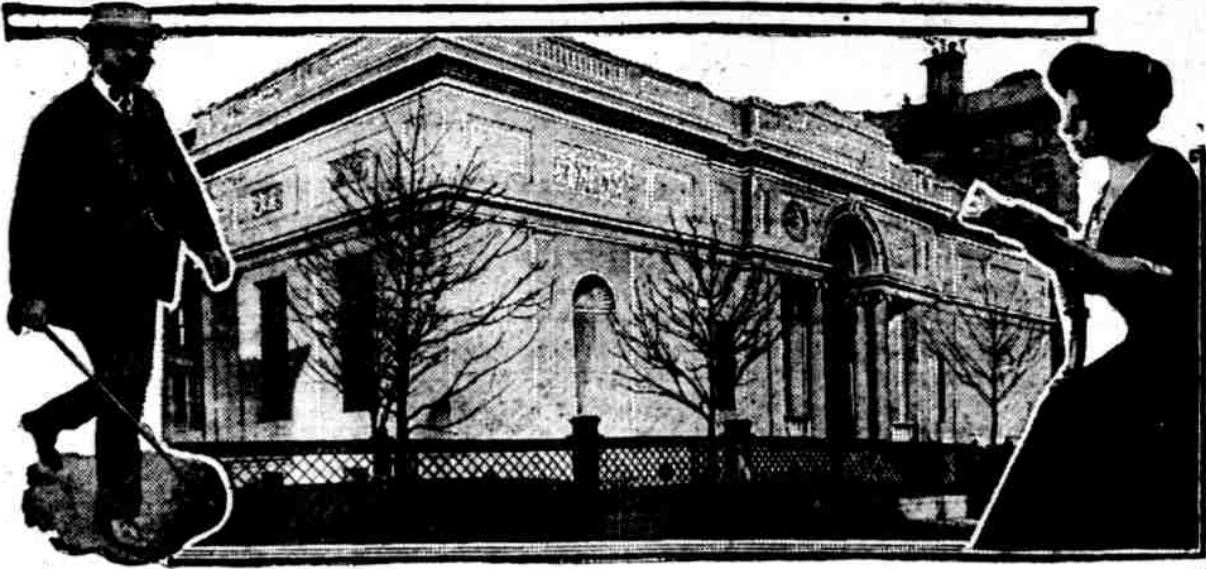


PUBLIC NOT TO GET MORGAN LIBRARY



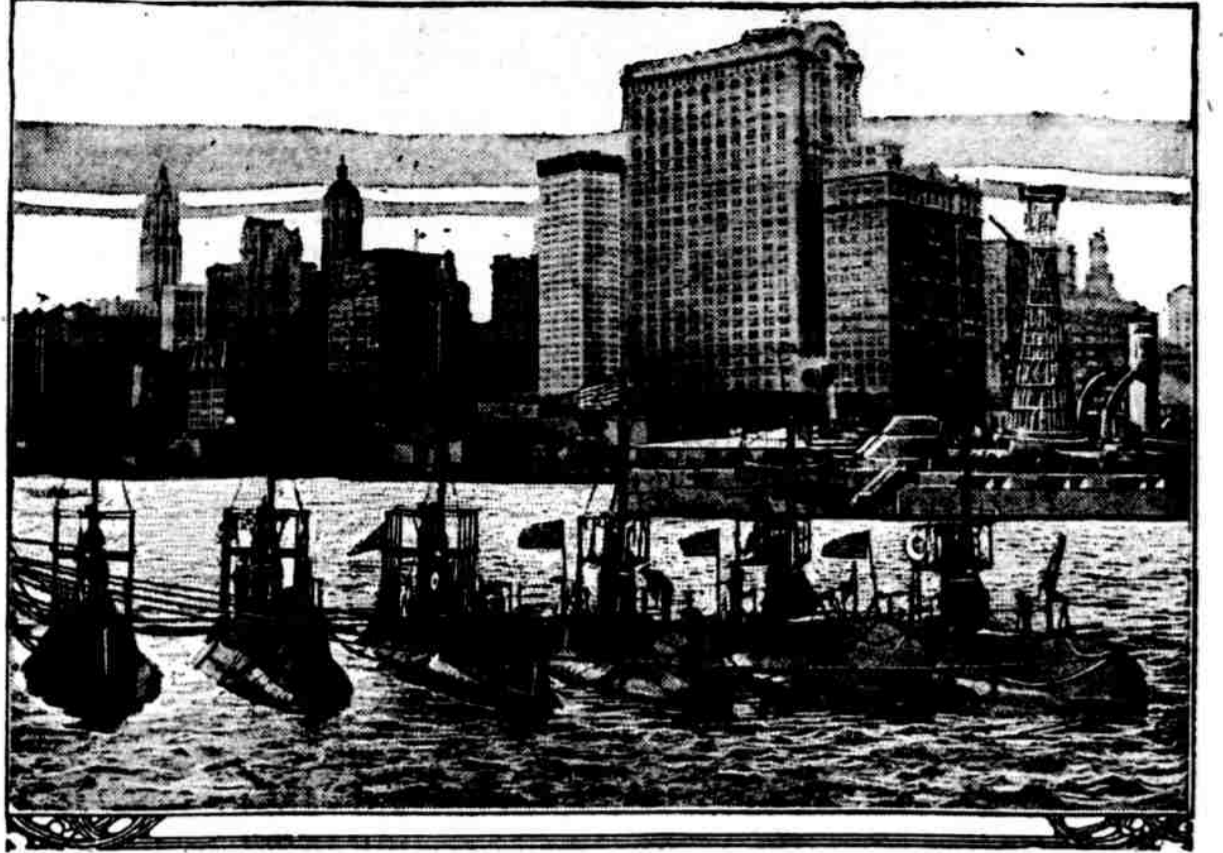

SIMPLICITY MARKS LIFE OF GREEK KING.



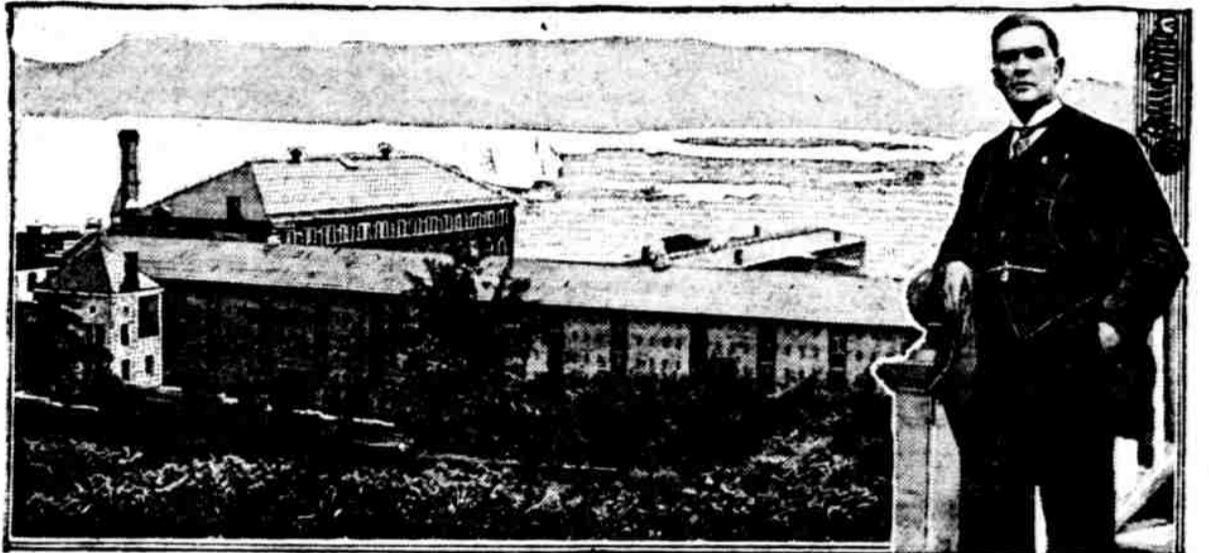
Unusual photograph of a ruler at dinner—Constantine of Greece and his family. This might be taken for the home of any American family of moderate means.
