

## "SINK 'EM ALL," IS ORDER GIVEN THE SUBMARINES

### German Send More Ships to the Bottom—British People Demanding Reprisal Measures to Be Started at Once—Crews of Sunken Vessels Rescued

LONDON, April 2.—Dispatches from Newcastle state that the crews of the trawlers *Gladiola* and *Nellie* were saved, and it is thought that the crew of the *Jason*, the third trawler sunk by the U-10 is also safe. The officers of the submarine passed cigars to the crews of the vessels before torpedoing them. The commander of the U-10 said he had orders to "sink everything about."

LONDON, April 2.—Reprisals are being demanded by the British press and public as the result of the torpedoing of more British merchantmen and killing of thirty more people by the German submarines.

Shippers are circulating petitions asking that German prisoners be placed aboard all of the merchantmen. This, they state, should cause the Germans to be less destructive, to save German lives.

The admiralty, however, doubts the feasibility of the scheme. It declares that Germany is playing a desperate game, and would probably continue torpedoing anyhow.

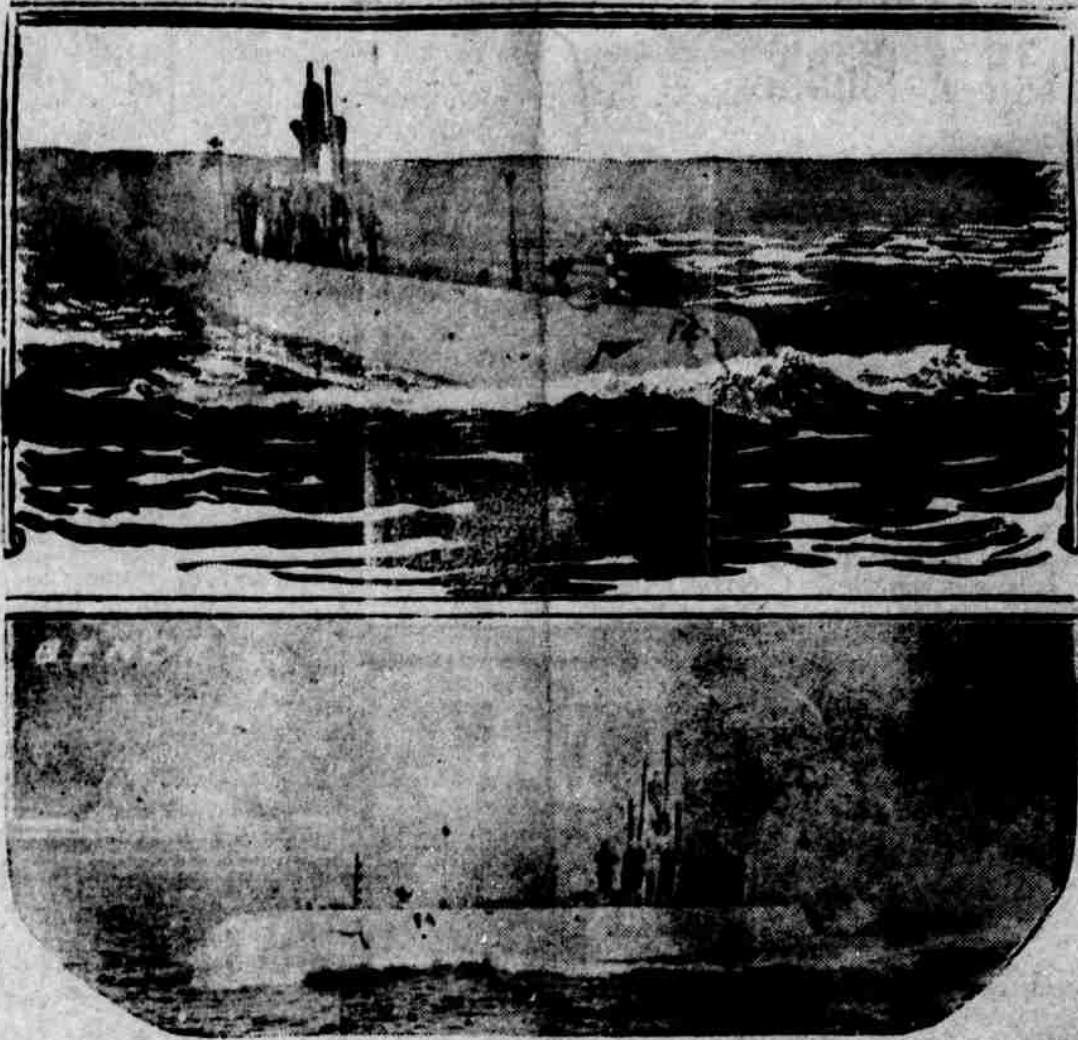
Four more ships were sunk today. Newcastle reports that the German submarine U-10 torpedoed and sank three trawlers off the mouth of the River Tyne, and it feared the crews perished.

Amsterdam cables that the submarine U-20 sank the Norwegian sailing vessel *Nor* off the Holland coast this morning.

Telegram from Rotterdam state that several submarines have been sighted at different points along the Holland coast. This indicates that the whole German submarine flotilla is busy.

It is believed that Germany's plan is to terrorize England by making attacks simultaneously along all of the coast.

## Views of American Submarine F-4, Sunk Recently at Honolulu



The F-4 went down to the bottom of Honolulu Harbor in 720 feet of water during maneuvers of warships there. She held a crew of at least eighteen men, under command of Lieutenant Ede. The F-4 was launched January 6, 1913, and was the first craft of the kind built by the Seattle Construction and Dry Dock company. J. V. Patterson, president of the company, said that the F-4 was submerged twenty-four hours at her builders' trial, and could remain that length of

time under water without inconvenience to the crew. The F-4, which cost \$500,000, is 142 feet 7 inches long, 16 feet 10 inches deep, and 15 feet 3 inches beam. She was designed for a cruising radius of 2,400 miles, and is fitted with four torpedo tubes.

## FREIGHT SERVICE TO BE IMPROVED

### SOUTHERN PACIFIC WILL PUT ON SWITCH TRAIN HERE MONDAY TO HANDLE LOCAL BUSINESS. MAY MEAN MORE TRAINS

According to advices received today, the Southern Pacific has ordered a switch engine stationed here, beginning Monday, to handle the local switching as last year, and to make trips with a combination freight and passenger train to Meva, Mondays and Wednesdays and to Kirk Fridays, giving a three times a week service to Algoma and Chiloquin, instead of twice a week, as at present.

The stationing of a switch train here will relieve the crew on the freight coming in twice a week from Weed of switching and of the trips to Meva and Kirk. This, local shippers believe, will mean that there will be a freight train from Weed three times a week hereafter, instead of twice a week.

## RUSSIAN WIRES SAY AUSTRIANS SEEKING PEACE

### Story Not Confirmed by Diplomats—The Situation in Italy Is Such That a Tiny Spark Will Set off the Powder—Much Depends on Greece

LONDON, April 2.—With vast Russian armies threatening to burst through into Hungarian territory, Austrian diplomats are making overtures for separate peace with Russia, according to reports from Petrograd. These are utterly unconfirmed officially.

Swiss diplomats are reported as acting as go-betweens for the warring countries. The Petrograd stories assert that the Swiss diplomats carried Austrian peace offerings to Russia.

To these, Czar Nicholas is reported as replying in the negative. He stated that he could not negotiate for peace except acting simultaneously with the governments of France and England.

Petrograd correspondents are inclined to credit these reports. They were first published in the "Rusky Slovo," a newspaper of great reliability. Diplomats here generally discredit the stories.

## PHEASANT EGGS TRACK MEET TO BE HELD IN MAY

### STATE FISH AND GAME COMMISSION WILL FURNISH SETTINGS TO THOSE MAKING APPLICATION FOR THEM

Do you wish to assist in the introduction of China pheasants in the Klamath country by purchasing a setting of eggs and setting them under a hen? If so, you can secure these at a reasonable price from the State Fish and Game Commission.

According to Commissioner Stone, there are a number of Klamath county people making application for eggs. They intend to liberate the birds at maturity.

There is a possibility that the commission will purchase pheasants in each locality wherever possible, to be liberated there. These birds would be acclimated, and the state would be saved the expense of shipping them from the state farm. It costs about \$3.50 to raise a pair of pheasants at the state farm, and the price paid would be about this figure.

The price of tin fluctuates very rapidly and widely.

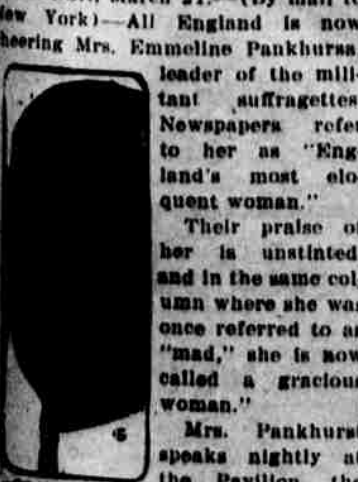

LONDON, March 21.—(By mail to New York)—All England is now cheering Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes. Newspapers refer to her as "England's most eloquent woman."

occasion on which I appeared here. We were engaged then in an internal warfare—a warfare on the part of the women, who were denied by the government what they considered their legitimate rights of citizenship. "When we came here before we were fighting for our rights; now we are fighting for our duties. In the face of a terrible danger the people have forgotten their rights—they think now only of their duties."

Chancellor Lloyd George, Premier Asquith—in fact, all the government whose lives were made miserable through the criticism and physical attacks of Mrs. Pankhurst and her followers—were praised. "I am thankful and proud," she declared, "that the nation as represented by the government, is doing its duty. The Germans thought we were a decadent people. One of the reasons for this was that they saw women engaged with men in political warfare. "The Germans are not good psychologists. They should have known that the country in which the women have the courage to fight is the country where you will find courage in the men. In a country where women are crushed, you will find the men are of inferior quality." Invariably Mrs. Pankhurst's utterances are enthusiastically cheered.
