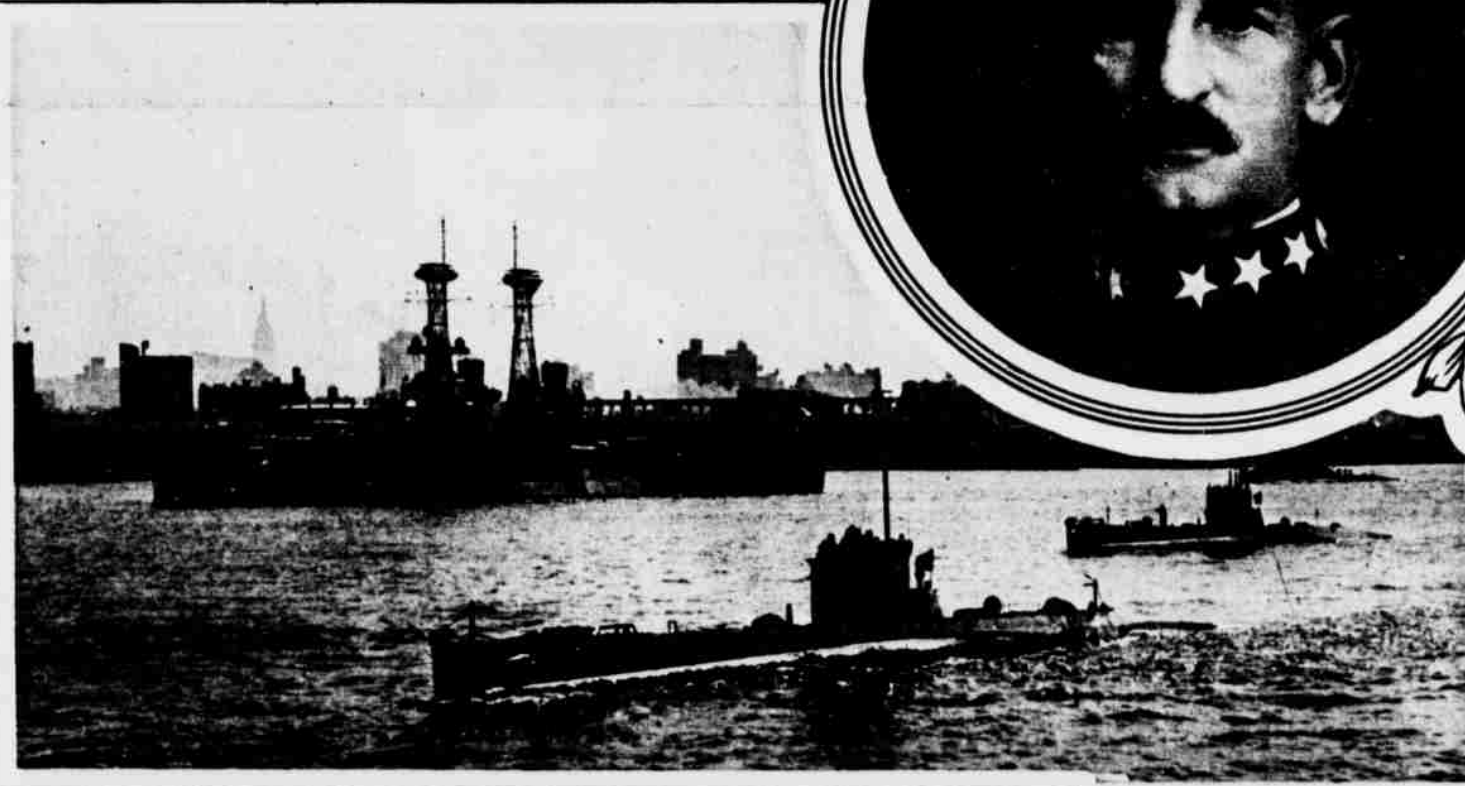

## NEW YORK WELCOMES FIGHTING SHIPS AND FIGHTING MEN



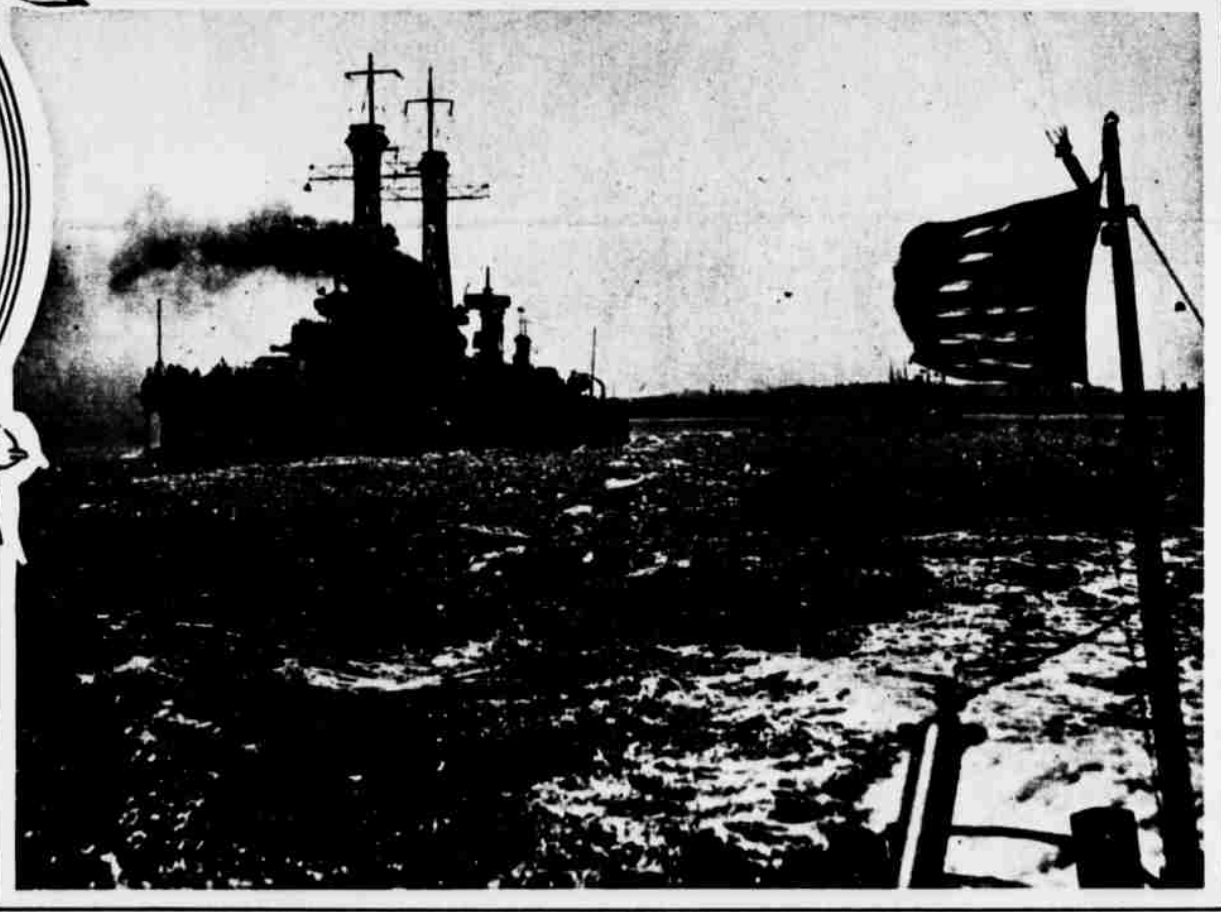

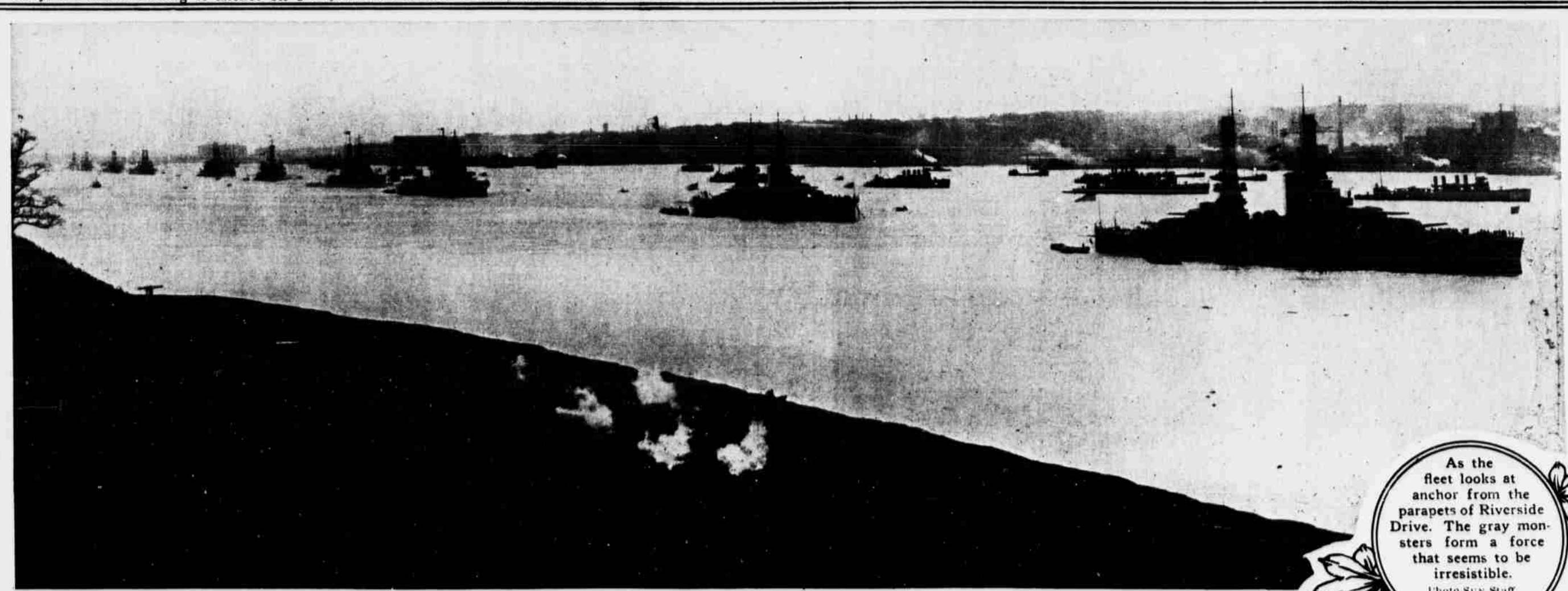
