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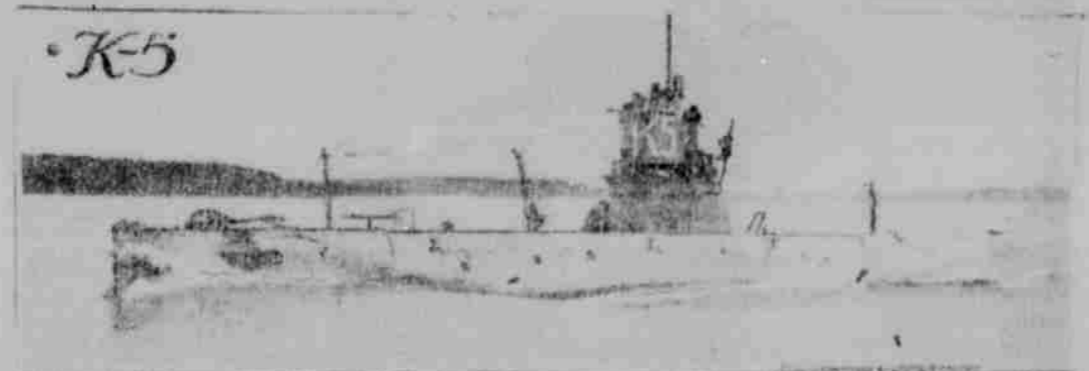
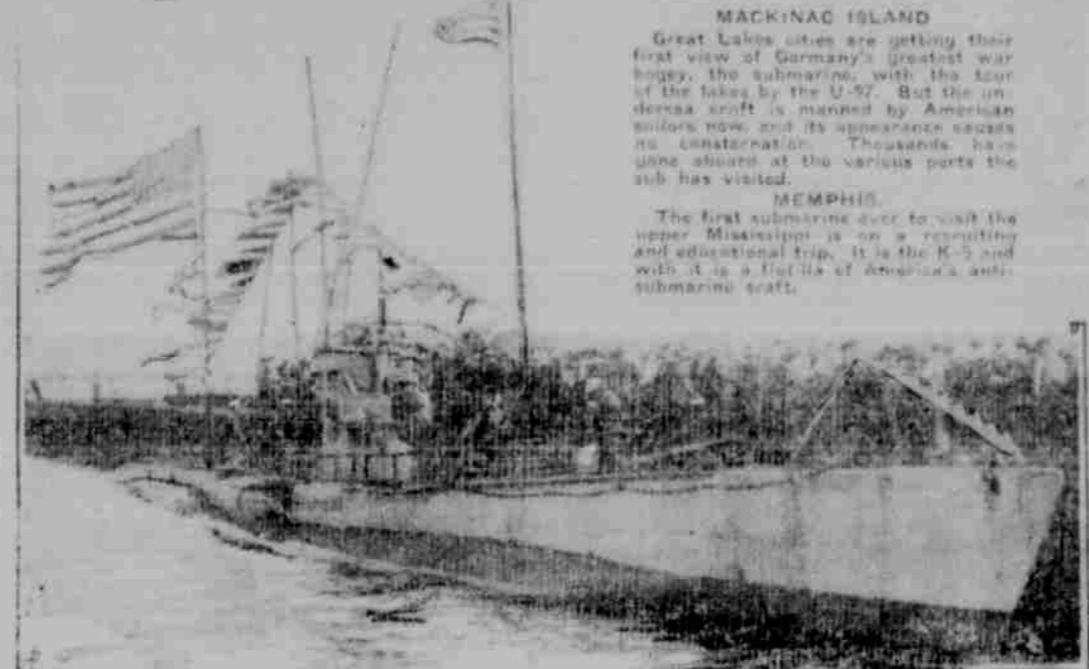
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SUBMARINES ON INLAND U. S. WATERS

WASHINGTON, July 23.—A plan for "interpretations" in Senate ratification of the League of Nations has been suggested by President Taft in the hope of uniting on a middle-ground between Democratic and Republican senators to defeat any radical amendment of the covenant, and in the end obtain its ratification.

The subject has been reviewed with earnest consideration by the group of Republicans who favor the league idea, and who already are at work on a definite program of interpretative reservations which they declare they have reason to believe will be accepted by the administration.

So confident are the league Republicans of the success of their plan that some of them believe President Wilson will publicly accept it to smooth the way to acceptance of the league. Some Republican senators, who have seen the president in the last few days, have come away from the White House with the impression that Mr. Wilson, while not endorsing reservations, if they can be avoided, might not be adverse to such interpretations as would leave the league fabric unimpaired.
