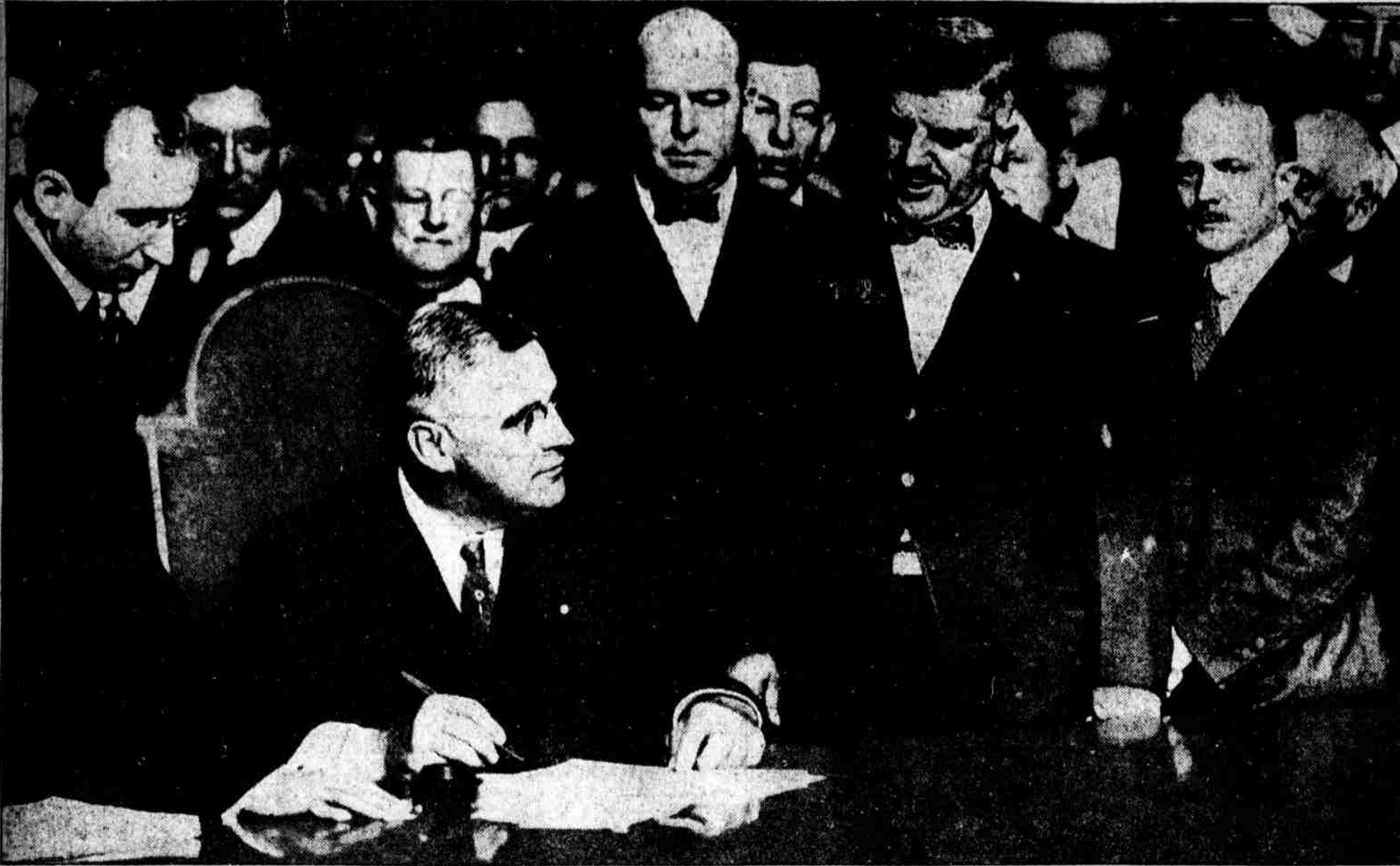


Governor Signs City's New Charter Bill : Captive Mine-Laying U-Boat Here : Divers Views

AS GOVERNOR SPROUL finished attaching his signature to the new charter bill he handed the pen to Senator George Woodward, sponsor of the reform measure.



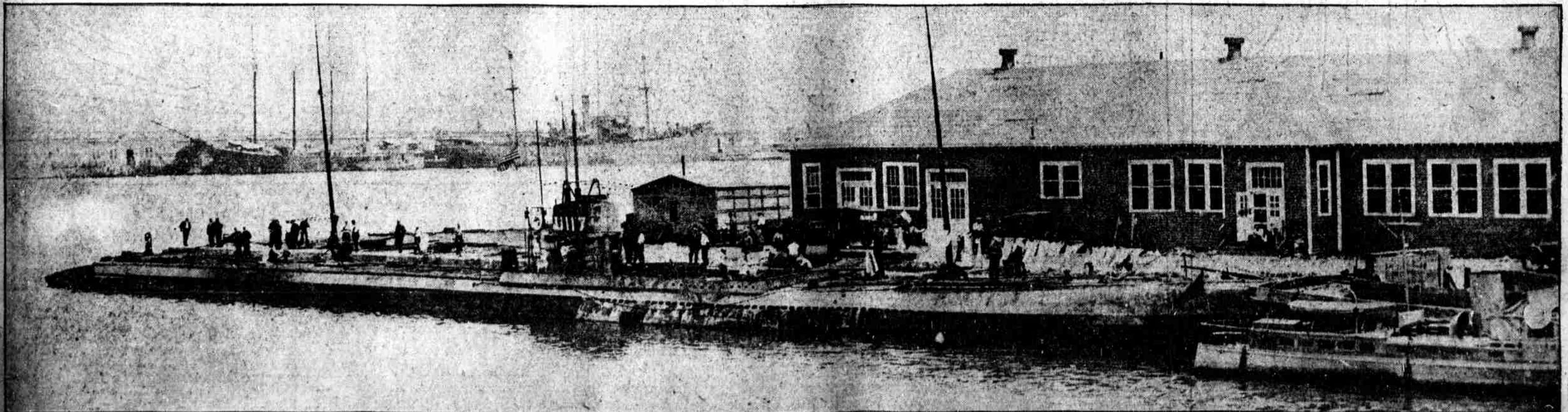
