

SAYS PAID IN CHINATOWN IS ONLY A PLANT

Prisoners' Counsel Asserts District-Attorney's Office Is Duped.

The big raid that Capt. Eagers and his men made in Chinatown yesterday resulted today in force in the Centre Street Court, when all of the prisoners were remanded in the custody of counsel until later in the day by Magistrate Crane.

That it was a fake raid there is no doubt. The prisoners were all of the Hip Sing Tong organization that is fighting the Ong Leong Tong. They were picked up anywhere and everywhere in the "village" and brought into court. Among the men arrested was Jim Wang, a Sunday-school Chinaman, who has been trying to stamp out gambling in Chinatown and who is employed by the Parkhurst Society.

Detective Pleads Ignorance. That is the way Magistrate Crane put it today.

"I can dispose of these thirty-one prisoners in five minutes," he said. "Bring them all up in a bunch."

"But, Your Honor," said Detective Ward, "Assistant District-Attorney Lord is preparing the affidavits now and we have to have time. Adjourn the matter until tomorrow."

The detective admitted that the arrests were made on the evidence submitted by Ong Leong Tong and he confessed that he didn't know much about it himself.

"We have here," said counsel for the Hip Sing Tong, "Jim Wang, who has furnished evidence against gambling-houses in Chinatown, and who was arrested just outside of the court. We also understand that Tom Lee has had a warrant issued for Mock Duck. Mock Duck is now in San Francisco. Here is Hughie Gow, a grocer, who has just made a deal with the United States Government to supply it with tea for the Philippine Islands. He was in his store yesterday when the officers broke in the doors, using axes and sledges. There wasn't any plant of graft in there, but the Police Department, following the instructions of Tom Lee's agents, forced their way in and arrested him."

All a Plant, Say Counsel. "It was all a plant and the Ong Leong Tong is using the Police Department and the District Attorney's Office as a spyglass. There is a plant of graft in Chinatown and somebody is getting it. At this point the Magistrate let all of the Chinamen depart, fixing a time for his hearing for it seemed odd for so much time to be taken up for a case in which nobody was interested.

No paraphernalia was taken by the detectives. Leo Loy, who is Tom Lee's brother, was on hand to report the proceedings to the Ong Leong Tong. The places raided were No. 18 Pell street, No. 11 Doyers street, No. 20 Pell street, No. 28 Pell street, No. 16 Pell street, No. 23 Pell street and No. 25 Pell street. While the raids were going on it is said that all the gambling places controlled by the Ong Leong Tong, of which Tom Lee is the head, were in full blast.

NEW ROCHELLE MAN MISSING FOR FIVE MONTHS.

Disappeared on His Way to New York and It Is Feared He May Be Demented or Dead.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., May 31.—A suit filed in a suit brought by the New Rochelle Company against John W. Ferguson, an old resident of New Rochelle, for the foreclosure of a mortgage on his residence in that city, in the Supreme Court at White Plains today developed the fact that Mr. Ferguson has been missing for five months, and it is not known if he is alive or dead.

In the action the suit is brought against Mr. Ferguson, "if alive," and his wife. The mortgage amounts to \$1,000, and if the case is pushed it will deprive Mrs. Ferguson of her home. Since Mr. Ferguson mysteriously disappeared five months, while apparently on his way to New York City, his relatives have been unable to get any trace of him. An endless chain of circulars bearing his picture and a full description was sent out by the New Rochelle judge against Ross Arcanum to induce members all over the United States asking each member to join in the search, but no response was received.

Other suits are now pending in the courts against Mr. Ferguson for notes which he gave and failed to pay. It is feared that the missing man who lived in New Rochelle for years, and married on a big artificial ice plant at Polham in opposition to the Ice Trust, became demented and is wandering about the country in an aimless manner or else he has committed suicide.

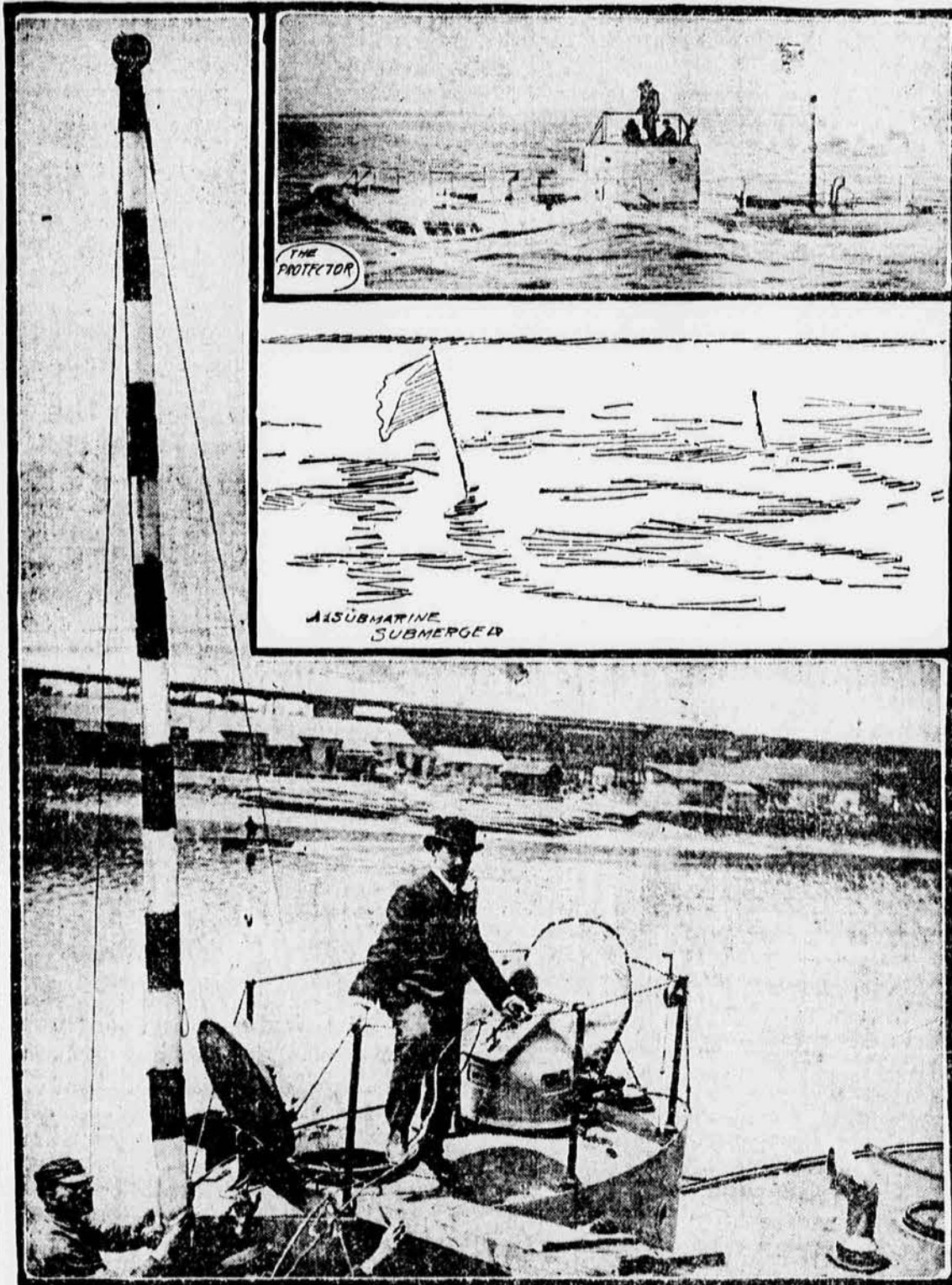
A Mail-Catching Creed.

MEAGHER'S BODY FOUND IN RIVER

Wealthy Retired Saloon-Keeper Had Been Missing a Week—Money and Jewelry Were in His Clothing.

Henry E. Meagher, a wealthy retired saloon-keeper, who lived with his wife at No. 181 East Ninety-first street, was today found drowned in the East River at the foot of Twenty-ninth street by Thomas Connelly, an employee of the Street-Cleaning Department, who lives at No. 435 East Fourteenth street.

Meagher had been missing a week, but as he frequently went away for days at a time no report of his absence had been made to the police. When his wife learned of his death today she collapsed and was unable to give the slightest explanation of how her husband came to his death.

Some of Meagher's friends believe that he committed suicide, and he certainly didn't meet with foul play, for \$58 in money and over \$100 worth of jewelry was found on him.

Meagher formerly kept a saloon at No. 67 Second avenue. He made a great deal of money and about a year ago sold out. Since then he has amused himself in various ways, but has had no regular occupation. His friends say that water had a curious fascination for the man, and that he would spend hours on the water front watching the river. They believe that he fell in while watching the water. He could not swim.

Meagher's valuables consisted of a watch, chain and locket worth \$50, a diamond stud worth \$25, a pair of diamond cuff buttons worth \$15 and a bank book showing deposits of about \$1,000 in the Metropolitan Bank.

Meagher was last seen alive on Wednesday, when he left his house saying he was going to see some friends. Where he went and how he got in the river is a complete mystery.

GAVE SERMON WITH FINGERS.

Samuel S. Brewer, a deaf-mute, died at No. 127 South Fourth avenue, Mount Vernon, and the funeral service took place there last night. His widow and four children are deaf and dumb.

In order that they might understand the service, a New York clergyman who uses the deaf and dumb language went to Mount Vernon and officiated. The clergyman first read the prayers and made the funeral oration to the friends and neighbors assembled in the room, and then interpreted to them with his fingers in the sign language to the widow and children, who sat at the head of the coffin.

Notwithstanding their misfortune the Brewers have been able to make a good living. The body of Mr. Brewer will be buried at Woodlawn Cemetery.

AUTOPSY SHOWS CHEMIST SUICIDE

Death of Emmett C. Handy at First Was Said by Doctors to Be Due to Heart Disease.

Emmett C. Handy, a chemist, of No. 324 Madison street, Brooklyn, utilized his knowledge of poisons in committing suicide to-day to such advantage that only an autopsy revealed the cause of death. When first his body was found by the landlady of the house, Mrs. Mary Sank, the doctor who was called in opined that Handy had died of heart disease.

The case was reported to the Coroner in the usual course, and Coroner's bench had not occurred from natural causes until Dr. Wuest saw and examined an empty tumbler on a stand alongside the bed. There was a trace of liquid in the tumbler. Dr. Wuest detected an odor that led him to suspect poison. The autopsy revealed the truth.

Handy left no letter explaining his self-destruction. Papers found among his effects showed that he had traveled all over the world. Before entering quarters at the Madison street house he had lived at No. 97 Buffalo avenue.
