

PARRAL IS TAKEN BY VILLA FORCES

Special Message to El Paso Tells of Victory For the Bandit Leader.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 3.—A message received by Americans here from Chihuahua City today reported that Parral, Chihuahua, had been taken by Villa troops. Gen. George Bell, Jr., commander of the El Paso patrol district stated that he had received no information of the capture of Parral. This town was given as Villa's objective when the bandit moved south from Santa Isabel.

At the general office of the Alvarado Mining and Milling Co. here it was stated that no information had been received in reference to the report that Villa troops had captured Parral. The Alvarado company is one of the largest operating in the Parral district and its officials are making efforts to obtain information from their representatives there by way of Chihuahua City and also by way of Eagle Pass, Tex., Torreon and Jimenez.

Gonzales Not Informed.
Gen. Francisco Gonzales, commander of the Carranza forces of the north, stated that he had received information from Chihuahua City regarding the reported capture of Parral by Villa forces but admitted that such information might have reached the border in private messages.

As far as known there are only nine Americans employed at Parral and that district at the present time. These are T. C. Hawkins, A. W. Morris, Leslie Webb, and Howard Gray, all with the Alvarado Mining and Milling Co.; W. E. Palmer, Dr. J. Flannigan, W. E. Gowell, C. B. Smith and another American whose name is unknown. Four of these men are employed at other mines in the Parral district and Dr. Flannigan is a practicing physician in Parral, according to Americans who formerly lived there.

Parral is 54 miles southwest of Jimenez, Chihuahua, and 116 miles in a straight line south of Chihuahua City.
Carranza Consul Eduardo Soriano Irivo denied that Parral had been taken. He said Gen. Luis Herrera had a garrison of 2,000 men in Parral and said the garrison was well supplied with ammunition, arms and artillery.
Mining men and ore freighters here, who are familiar with the country in the vicinity of Parral declared that Villa probably moved on Parral from Santa Rosalia, following the Conchas river to Pilar De Concha, a distance of 45 miles from Santa Rosalia and then marched south 45 miles against Parral, entering the town from the north, which is the most accessible way, they say.

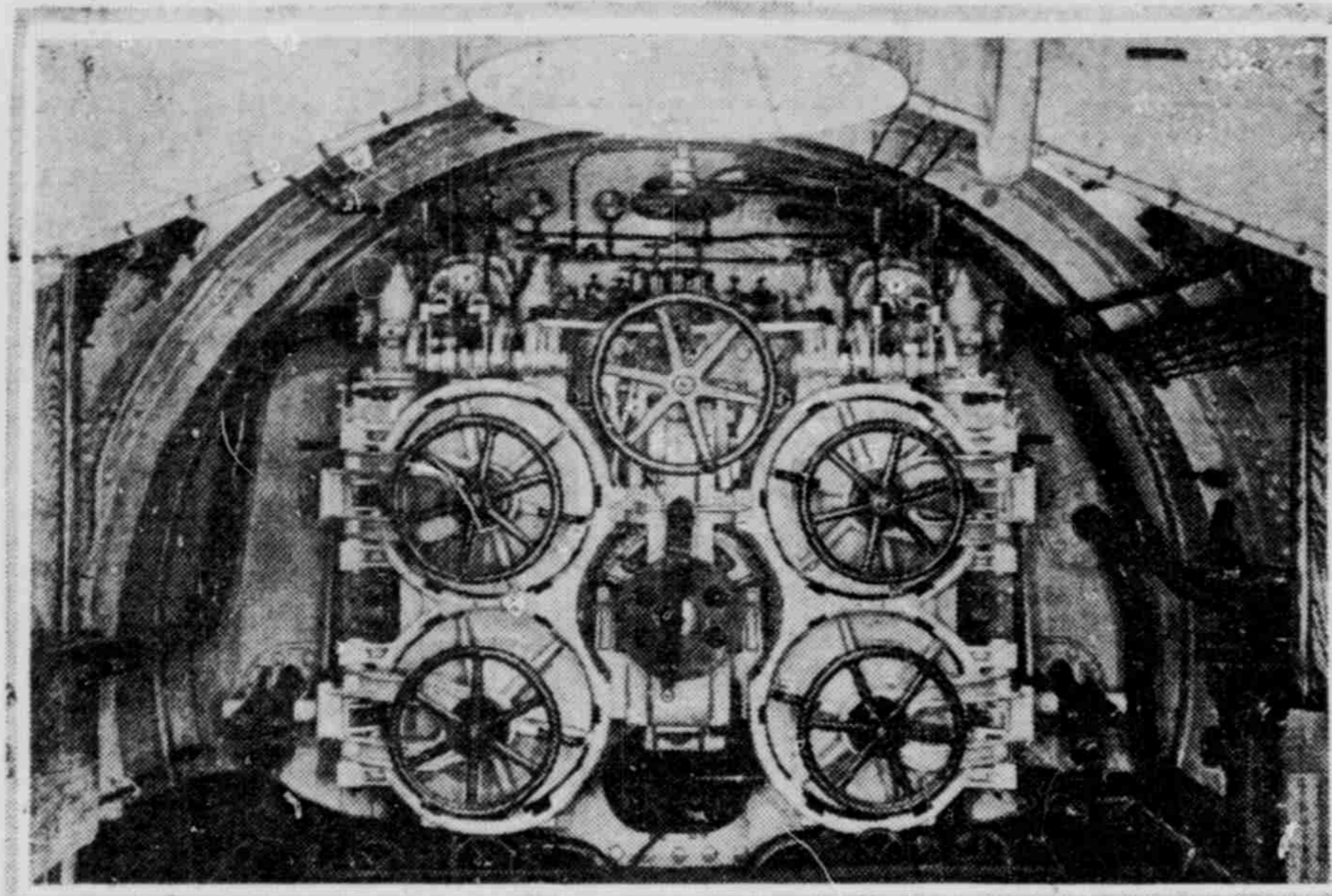
They said that the report of Villa's capture of the town verified another report that Villa and his command had been in possession of Santa Rosalia as it was announced that he would move on Parral from Santa Rosalia.
COMMISSION ADJOURNS.
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 3.—The net result of the nine weeks of conference of the Mexican-American joint commission, which adjourned Thursday over the election until November 10 is that the Mexican commissioners have learned that any agreement by the commission must cover not only the policing of the frontier, but Mexican internal affairs, it was learned Thursday. The American commissioners insist that any adjustment must deal with the basis principles of Mexican government.

KILLED LEARNING TO RIDE
PORT WAYNE, Ind., Nov. 3.—Mrs. Jack Edwards, 20 years old, was almost instantly killed Thursday night when she was thrown from a horse which her husband was teaching her to ride. He blames her death on himself saying he struck the animal with a whip to increase its gait. Her mount broke into a run and she was thrown to the pavement, fracturing her skull.

NEW CASTLE, Ind., Nov. 3.—Clarence Miers, 14 years old, is dead of wounds received accidentally while hunting. According to two companions Miers had placed his shotgun against a wire fence which he was about to climb. As he stepped on one of the wires, it caught on the hammer of the gun. The charge entered the boy's side. Death resulted in a few hours.

STATE CLUBWOMEN STICK TO ANNUAL MEETINGS

Federation Votes Down Proposition to Make Session Biennial Affair.
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 3.—A resolution to make the meetings of the Indiana Federation of Clubs biennial, was voted down Thursday at the annual meeting. An effort had been made by a number of leaders to extend the time between meetings, but the yearly plan was given a decisive vote. Other resolutions adopted provided for more power in the hands of the press chairman, who hereafter will give all news to the press; for the election of the general federation director on the floor of the convention and for the appointment of a committee to which shall be referred all requests from persons and organizations now affiliated with the organization. A resolution was submitted supporting the movement to preserve the Indiana sand dunes bordering Lake Michigan for a state park.
A sketch written by Mrs. Virginia C. Meredith of Cambridge City and Mrs. Frederick Blain Clark of Indianapolis, entitled "Indiana Women of a Hundred Years" was the chief feature of tonight's meeting.

NO DANGER OF FAMINE IN ANTHRACITE COAL

Pennsylvania Mine Owners Say \$12 a Ton Due to Frenzy of People.
WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Nov. 3.—P. M. Chase, vice president and general manager of the Lehigh Valley Coal Co., and C. F. Huber, vice president and general manager of the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre Coal Co. Thursday declared that there is no danger of an anthracite coal famine.
They say that \$12 coal is a false situation created through the frenzy of people, and offers an opportunity for speculators and independent operators to reap a financial harvest.
Both declared that there will be plenty of coal throughout the winter and that the big companies will not increase their circular prices or sell to dealers who advance prices above the regular winter standard.
