THE SPONSOR



Mrs. John McNay Taylor is a Californian by choice, if not by birth; she moved here at an early age from her birthplace, Birmingham, Alabama. She lived in Southern California with her family until her marriage in 1928 to Ensign John McNay Taylor, serving in the Pacific Fleet. They moved to their first duty station together, a temporary one, at the Twelfth Naval District Headquarters in San Francisco. THE SPEAKER



Robert Louis Leggett was elected to the 88th Congress in November 1962. He is presently serving his third term in Congress, and is a Member of the Armed Services Committee. Born in Richmond, California, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy and later attended the University of California, and California Boalt Hall School of Jurisprudence. Prior to his election to Congress, he practiced law in Northern California for 12 years, and served two years as a member of the California State Assembly.

He is married to the former Barbara Burnett of San Francisco, and they have three children; Diana, Jeanne, and Rob.

THE SHIP

The submarine GUITARRO is the 509th ship to be launched at Mare Island and the 14th nuclear submarine. This is the second submarine of the STURGEON (SSN 637) class to be built here, and three others of the same class will follow.

GUITARRO is a "fast attack" submarine measuring 292 feet in length and displacing approximately 4,100 tons. The primary weapon of this submarine is its torpedoes. Highly sophisticated sonars are used to seek out and identify enemy targets, both surface and submarine, and guide the use of the weapons.

The original GUITARRO (SS 363) of World War II fame was commissioned in Manitowoc, Wisconsin in January 1944, and accounted for 23,132 tons of enemy shipping during patrols in World War II. The ship was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation and four battle stars before being decommissioned at San Diego on 7 August 1954. The ship was later turned over to and commissioned PREVESE (D 7) in the Turkish Navy.

THE SHIPYARD

The San Francisco Bay Naval Shipyard was established at Vallejo, California on 11 May 1965, by the merger of the Mare Island Naval Shipyard, oldest Naval establishment on the Pacific Coast, and the San Francisco Naval Shipyard, in operation since 1945 as a naval shipyard.

The merged Shipyard comprises 3,335 acres of hard land, with the potential of expansion of 6,056 acres, and represents an investment of \$480,000,000. Civilian employees now number over 20,000, with a military population of 8,300. The annual payroll for 1968 amounted to \$190,000,000 for civilians, and \$17,300,000 for military, a total of \$207,300,000.

Today's launching is the 509th ship to be launched here since the establishment of the Shipyard nearly 114 years ago.

Prior to the Official Program, Mr. Louis B. Burgelin will give an informal report to guests on the progress of the launching operations.
