



The project, officially disclose in Ottawa and Washington, in-volves the joint establishment of nine new weather stations in anadian territory. It is part of the recently announced plan to continue the war-time collaboration of the two na-

tions by exchanging information, personnel and facilities for "peace-time joint security purposes." Two Stations in Far North At least two of the new stations will be in the far north, one on Ellamere island, 600 miles from the North pole, another to the westward on Melville island. westward on Melville island. Editor's Note: This is the ninth of 12 stories explaining who must do what about filing his income tax return.)

By James Marlow Washington, March 5-(P)-Figuring your income tax on the 1040 long form is a little different from last year.

Last year you had to figure separately your normal tax and your surtax and then add them to get the total tax due. This year, for purposes of figuring tax, the normal tax and the surtax have been combined into

Your taxable \$5,500 will be in the line where it says "over \$4,000 out not over \$6,000." Right across from that bracket you see that the tax on the first \$4,000 of your taxable \$5,500 is \$840, plus 26 per cent of the remaining \$1,500, or \$390.

Another Step Yet Adding the \$390 to the \$840, you write the total tax, \$1,230, on Line 6, Page 4 of the long form. But hat isn't the tax you have to pay.

There's another step. You take 5 per cent of \$1.230-H's \$61.50-and write the \$61.50 on Line 7. Subtract the \$61.50 from the \$1.230 on Line 6 and write the result. \$1,186.50 c
